SHORTAGE OF SOCIAL WORKERS DISCUSSED
The Central Ontario Branch of the Canadian Association of Social Workers had as their guest speaker, Miss Bessie Touzel, Executive Director of the Ontario Welfare Council, and Vice Chairman of the International Federation of Social Workers, at their meeting in the offices of the Wentworth County Children's Aid Society, Dundas, November 12.
Miss Touzel brought to the local group, information on what the Ontario Welfare Council is doing regarding recruitment of social workers. Although the provincial committee can do much in the way of bringing social work before the public via reading, material, radio and television, there is still a great need for the local committee to provide personal contacts.
There was lively discussion following Miss Touzel's talk and the local committee drew on the group for ideas as to how one can provide personal contacts in the Central Ontario area. Reaching high school students through school counsellors would be one way of informing young people and interesting them in this rewarding profession. The committee will be utilizing this idea and others throughout the coming year.

Wilson Honsberger, Director of the Children's Aid Society of Kitchener-Waterloo, thanked Miss Touzel for her clear, potent talk on this vital subject.
F. A. Parsons of the Hamilton department of Veteran's Affairs is chairman of the local committee on recruitment of social workers. William Main, Family Service Bureau, Hamilton; Howard Best, John Howard Society, Hamilton, and Mrs. Alvis Syat, Family Service Bureau, Kitchener are serving on the committee.
Members from St. Catharines, Milton, Guelph, Galt, Brant, Kitchener-Waterloo and Hamilton were present.
