

Notice to All Electors of the Town of Georgetown Qualified to Vote on Money By-Laws

On Monday, December 10, 1956, at the next ensuing Municipal election you will be asked to vote for or against the following money by-law:

By-Law No. 56-39

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN
A BY-LAW to authorize the borrowing of \$111,000 upon debentures to pay for the cost of alterations and additions to the Georgetown Memorial Arena in the manner set forth in Schedule "B" hereto annexed.

WHEREAS the Board of Parks Management for the Town of Georgetown has applied to the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown to raise the sum of One Hundred and Eleven Thousand (\$111,000.00) by borrowing such sum upon debentures for the purpose of making alterations and additions to the Georgetown Memorial Arena in the manner set forth in Schedule "B" hereto annexed;

AND WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown has deemed it advisable to obtain the assent of the electors of the Town of Georgetown to the issue of the necessary debentures for the purpose aforesaid;

AND WHEREAS by By-law No. 56-40 this by-law was submitted to the electors of the Town of Georgetown on the 10th day of December, 1956 for their assent;

AND WHEREAS at the vote there were votes in favour of this By-law and votes against this By-law;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and advisable to grant such application to borrow the said sum of One Hundred and Eleven thousand dollars (\$111,000.00) for the purposes aforesaid upon the credit of the Corporation and to issue debentures therefor bearing interest at the rate of Five and One-half per centum (5½%) payable annually, which said sum of One Hundred and Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$111,000.00) is the amount of debt intended to be created hereby;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in annual instalments during the period of fifteen years next after the date of issue of such debentures, of such amounts respectively that with the interest in respect of such amounts respectively that with the interest in respect of the debt the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in each year shall be as nearly as possible the same; subject to the statutory proviso that each instalment of principal may be for an even \$100.00, \$500.00 or \$1,000.00, or multiple thereof, and that notwithstanding anything herein contained, the annual instalments of principal and interest may differ in amount sufficiently to admit thereof;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the municipality according to the last revised assessment roll thereof is \$8,827,435;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the Corporation exclusive of local improvement debts secured by special rates or assessments, is \$758,887.24 and no part of the principal or interest of such debt is in arrears; and the amount of additional debenture debt authorized but not incurred because no debentures have yet been issued under the By-law is \$239,625.52;

AND WHEREAS by Order dated the day of 1956 the Ontario Municipal Board has approved the purpose of the said borrowing and the passing of all requisite by-laws, including debenture by-laws;

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown pursuant to Section 386, Sub-Section 53 of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1950, Chapter 243, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. For the purpose aforesaid, the Corporation shall borrow upon the credit of the Corporation a sum not exceeding One Hundred and Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$111,000.00) and shall issue serial debentures therefor in the sums of

not less than \$50.00 each. Each debenture shall bear interest at the rate of Five and One-half per centum (5½%) per annum payable annually and shall have coupons attached thereto for the payment of such interest.

2. That the debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued at one time and within two years after the day on which this By-law is passed, may bear any date within such two years and shall be made payable in annual instalments during the period of fifteen (15) years next after the date of issue thereof, and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such years shall be the amounts so designated in Schedule "A" hereto annexed.

3. That the debentures shall be payable as to both principal and interest in lawful money of Canada and may be made payable at such place, or places, in Canada as shall be designated thereon.

4. The said debentures shall be sealed with the Seal of the Corporation and signed by the head of the Council, or by some other person authorized by By-law to sign the same, and by the Treasurer. The said interest coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer and his signature thereon may be written, stamped, lithographed or engraved.

5. Commencing in the year 1958 and thereafter in each year in which an instalment of principal of the said debt and interest become due, the Corporation shall levy and raise the specific sum shown for the respective year in the fourth column of the said Schedule. Such sum shall be levied and raised by a special rate sufficient therefor, over and above all other rates, upon all the rateable property in the Municipality.

6. The said debentures may contain a clause providing for the registration thereof pursuant to Section No. 335 of the Municipal Act.

7. Pending the sale of the said debentures, the head of the Council and the Treasurer may raise for the purpose aforesaid by way of loan on such debentures any sum, or sums, of money not exceeding in all the sum hereby authorized to be borrowed and may hypothecate such debentures for such loan.

8. The Corporation shall have the right at its option to redeem the said debentures either in whole or in part on any date prior to maturity at the places where and in the moneys in which the said debentures are expressed to be payable, upon payment of the principal amount thereof together with interest accrued to the date of redemption and upon giving previous notice of said intention to redeem by advertising once in the Ontario Gazette and once in a daily newspaper of general provincial circulation, published in the City of Toronto, and once in a local newspaper, such notice to be advertised as aforesaid at least sixty days before the date fixed for redemption. Notice of intention so to redeem shall also be sent by post at least sixty days prior to the date set for such redemption to each person in whose name a debenture so to be redeemed is registered at the address shown in the Debenture Registry Book.

BY-LAW read a First time this 15th day of October, 1956.

5. The vote on the foregoing proposed By-law will be taken on the tenth day of December, 1956, at the following places:

Ward 1A: At the residence of Mrs. Maynard, Arletta Street.

Ward 1B: At the Fire Hall, Guelph Street.

Ward 2A: At the residence of Mrs. George Barnes, 47 John Street.

Ward 2B: At the residence of Thomas Grieve, 25 Queen Street.

Ward 2C: At the residence of Mrs. Norene Presswood, 20 Mordock Street.

Ward 3A: At the residence of Gerard Wilcox, 142 Guelph Street.

Ward 3B: At the Municipal Building, Main Street North.

Ward 3C: At the Public Library, Church Street.

In this award, the entries for which must be pure bred barrows or sows, John W. Wilson, of Haltonville, had two carcasses in competition, both of which took red ribbons.

Market Cattle

The judging of the champion steers for the A. P. Westervelt memorial trophy along with the judging of the Queen's Guineas classes would appear to be the highlight of the week's livestock show in the big ring. In any event spectator interest is intense as judge Charlie Yule, Calgary calmly and yet dramatically picks his tops. When the Shorthorn champion steers were being selected all Haltonians got a lift to note that from the four sections of the 8 top steers, two of them were from Halton, Carolyn Gardhouse having the first prize senior calf, and Katherine Merry the second prize steer in the same class. Carolyn's steer incidentally took the award of reserve champion Shorthorn steer, and moved on to meet the champion Herefords and Angus. However, the grand champion award went to Alex Edwards' sunmer yearling Angus steer amid tumultuous applause from the Angus enthusiasts.

Your Dental Health

THE WAY TO BETTER DENTAL HEALTH

First in a series of articles prepared by Halton Health Unit

It begins to look as though tooth decay may lose its title of civilization's most widespread malady.

"There doesn't seem much likelihood of ever completely eliminating tooth decay as a menace but top-flight authorities do see a dramatic reversal of the present trend and a better chance for everyone to have good teeth.

The chances of reducing the toll taken by other dental ailments are also growing brighter.

"Never before has the dental profession been possessed of so many effective weapons for the prevention of disease," says the Canadian Dental Association.

"There is little excuse today for the appalling statistics that reflect the enormity of the effects of dental disease. The problem now is one of putting knowledge into action."

The chief weapon of the dentist is education, because unless the public learns the value of regular dental examinations and of proper oral hygiene and diet, the dentist cannot fully utilize the advances which dental science has made. But with these advances, he hopes to effect a sharp reduction not only in dental decay, but in other dental ailments as well.

Periodontal diseases, for example. These are the diseases of the gums and supporting structures of the teeth, and the chief reason for loss of teeth after the age of 35. These diseases actually cause more loss of teeth than does dental decay.

Early and regular dental treatment is also important in the aligning of teeth which have come into the mouth irregularly and in the correction of improper jaw relationship.

Another effective weapon in the fight against dental disease is the fluoridation of community water supplies. Fluoridation has reduced dental decay by as much as 65 per cent.

Middlesex 4H-er Queen's Guineas

Ontario had some 22,000 young people enrolled in 4-H work in '56. Two hundred and fifty-three of these young people entered their steers for the coveted Queen's Guineas at the Winter Fair. With the 253 club members came their parents and friends, and as a result standing room was at a premium in the huge Coliseum. Without question this class attracts the largest ringside of the week's livestock show and with it there is a tremendous amount of glamour.

In the Shorthorn division which attracted 93 entries, the top award went to Barry McQuillan of Huron county, and the reserve to Helen Anderson, of Dufferin County.

The Angus section brought together 82 doddies and here judge Yule selected as his top the steer of Donald Pullen of Perth County, with the reserve going to Ralph Shaw of Kent County. The Hereford division brought out 78 white sweated 4-H's and their respective "white faces." Here Ronald McLean of Middlesex had the top, and Joan Pettit of South Simcoe, the reserve. In the final analysis Ronald McLean's Angus took the Queen's Guineas with the reserve going to the champion Shorthorn exhibited by Barry McQuillan. Halton was represented by Janet Henderson, Ian Norrish and Don Moffat in the Shorthorn section, with the first named getting her steer in the red ribbon group; Lynne Coulter, Evelyn and Patricia McKay, and Sandy Heppburn in the Angus division, all of whom had their steers in the second prize group.
