

Notice to All Electors of the Town of Georgetown Qualified to Vote on Money By-Laws

On Monday, December 10, 1956, at the next ensuing Municipal election you will be asked to vote for or against the following money by-law:

By-Law No. 56-39

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN
A BY-LAW to authorize the borrowing of \$111,000 upon debentures to pay for the cost of alterations and additions to the Georgetown Memorial Arena in the manner set forth in Schedule "B" hereto annexed.

WHEREAS the Board of Parks Management for the Town of Georgetown has applied to the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown to raise the sum of One Hundred and Eleven Thousand (\$111,000) by borrowing such sum upon debentures for the purpose of making alterations and additions to the Georgetown Memorial Arena in the manner set forth in Schedule "B" hereto annexed;

AND WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown is deemed it advisable to obtain the assent of the electors of the Town of Georgetown to the issue of the necessary debentures for the purpose aforesaid;

AND WHEREAS by By-law No. 56-40 this by-law was submitted to the electors of the Town of Georgetown on the 10th day of December, 1956 for their assent;

AND WHEREAS at the vote there were votes in favour of this By-law and votes against this By-law;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and advisable to grant such application to borrow the said sum of One Hundred and Eleven thousand dollars (\$111,000) for the purposes aforesaid upon the credit of the Corporation and to issue debentures therefor bearing interest at the rate of Five and One-half per centum (5½%) payable annually, which said sum of One Hundred and Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$111,000.00) is the amount of debt intended to be created hereby;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in annual instalments during the period of fifteen years next after the date of issue of such debentures, of such amounts respectively that, with the interest in respect of such amounts respectively that, with the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in each year shall be as nearly as possible the same; subject to the statutory proviso that each instalment of principal may be for an even \$100.00, \$500.00, or \$1,000.00, or multiple thereof, and that notwithstanding anything herein contained, the annual instalments of principal and interest may differ in amount sufficiently to admit thereof;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the municipality according to the last revised assessment roll thereof is \$8,827,435;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debt of the Corporation exclusive of local improvement debts secured by special rates or assessments, is \$756,827.24 and no part of the principal or interest of such debt is in arrears, and the amount of

additional debenture debt authorized but not incurred because no debentures have yet been issued under the By-law is \$229,625.52; AND WHEREAS by Order dated day of , 195 , the Ontario Municipal Board has approved the purpose of the said borrowing and the passing of all requisite by-laws, including debenture by-laws;

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown pursuant to Section 386, Sub-Section 53 of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1950, Chapter 243, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. For the purpose aforesaid, the Corporation shall borrow upon the credit of the Corporation a sum not exceeding One Hundred and Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$111,000.00) and shall issue serial debentures therefor in the sum of not less than \$500 each. Each debenture shall bear interest at the rate of Five and One-half per centum (5½%) per annum payable annually and shall have coupons attached thereto for the payment of such interest.

2. That the debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued at one time and within two years after the day on which this By-law is passed, may bear any date within such two years and shall be made payable in annual instalments during the period of fifteen years next after the date of issue thereof, and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such years shall be the amounts so designated in Schedule "A" hereto annexed.

3. That the debentures shall be payable as to both principal and interest in lawful money of Canada and may be made payable at such place, or places, in Canada as shall be designated thereon.

4. The said debentures shall be sealed with the Seal of the Corporation and signed by the head of the Council, or by some other person authorized by By-law to sign the same, and by the Treasurer. The said interest coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer and his signature thereon may be written, stamped, lithographed or engraved.

5. Commencing in the year 1958 and thereafter in each year in which an instalment of principal of the said debt and interest become due, the Corporation shall levy and raise the specific sum shown for the respective year in the fourth column of the said Schedule. Such sum shall be levied and raised by a special rate sufficient therefor, over and above all other rates, upon all the rateable property in the Municipality.

6. The said debentures may contain a clause providing for the registration thereof pursuant to Section No. 335 of the Municipal Act.

7. Pending the sale of the said debentures, the head of the Council and the Treasurer may raise for the purpose aforesaid by way of loan on such debentures any sum or sums of money not exceeding in all the sum hereby authorized to be borrowed and may hypothecate such debentures for such loan.

8. The Corporation shall have the right at its option to redeem the said debentures either in whole or in part on any date prior to maturity at the places where and in the moneys in which the said debentures are expressed to be payable, upon payment of the principal amount thereof together with interest accrued to the date of redemption and upon giving previous notice of said intention to redeem by advertising once in the Ontario Gazette and once in a daily newspaper of general provincial circulation, published in the City of Toronto, and once in a local newspaper, such notice to be advertised as aforesaid at least sixty days before the date fixed for redemption. Notice of intention so to redeem shall also be sent by post at least sixty days prior to the date set for such redemption to each person in whose name a debenture so to be redeemed is registered at the address shown in the Debenture Registry Book.

BY-LAW read a First time this 15th day of October, 1956.

EVERYONE EVANGELIST SAYS DINNER SPEAKER

"Evangelism is a constant process of spreading the Christian gospel, and not any special event or big campaign," said Rev. J. Bartlett, Orangeville, director of religious education for the Niagara Anglican diocese.

Mr. Bartlett was speaking to members of the St. Alban's Chapter, Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen, at their annual dinner in the Glen Williams parish hall November 20th.

Evangelists like Billy Graham have their place in the world and accomplish much good, he said, but it is the Christian less-gifted with oratory, working with his minister and his church who does a continuing job of evangelism.

"The most difficult is experienced, he said, in reaching people who have another religion. To some, religion is making money, having a good time, self-entertainment or being a 'good fellow'."

These are the folks a churchman should try to reach and convert to being followers of Christ, he said.

Some 75 men attended the dinner, including several guests from the Glen United Church, and others from Georgetown, Norval, Stewarttown and Hornby. Brian Holliday, retiring president of the deacons BAC and the new president Hamilton Smith of Oakville were also guests.

The evening concluded with showing of a Hollywood produced film starring James Dunn, which had a strong religious theme.

William Korzack, BAC president, was chairman. Rural Dean Rev. J. E. Maxwell, Norval, pronounced the benediction. Jack Crawford Sr. thanked the guild ladies who catered for the turkey dinner, and Arthur Beaumont extended thanks to the speaker, Rev. Kenneth Richardson introduced Mr. Bartlett.

Mrs Eldon McKinney Wingham's "First Lady"

Mrs. Eldon McKinney, wife of Wingham's mayor, who died in St. Joseph's Hospital, London, recently, was a native of Georgetown.

Her father, W. H. Gurney who died earlier this year, was employed here at the old Arnold Glove Factory and later in Acton, where the family moved when she was a girl. Mr. Gurney later established his own business in Wingham.

Mrs. McKinney was a valued member of the Wingham community. She was active in the ladies' organizations of Knox Presbyterian Church, president of the Wingham Hospital ladies' auxiliary, and took a leading place in bowling, golf and curling clubs and the Eastern Star in Wingham, and the Granite Club, Toronto.

Educated in Wingham and Stratford Normal School, she taught at schools in the Wingham area before her marriage. Mr. and Mrs. McKinney lived in London and Toronto before returning to make their home in Wingham.

Surviving are her husband, one son James of Toronto who has just graduated from University of Western Ontario, London and has commenced a course in chartered accounting in Toronto, and one brother, W. W. Gurney, Wingham.

"Henry Shepherd Night" At Canadian Legion Thursday

Well... now you know! We shall not attempt to chronicle last Thursday's meeting in order, but rather will take it in parts, the most important part, coming first.

First, the background and the reason for the whole affair... For quite a number of years, there has been a decided feeling and agitation by members of the branch, to have a 'Henry Shepherd night' in recognition of the outstanding services he has given to the branch as a parade marshal over the past twenty eight years. Although a good many of our older members deserve recognition, it was felt that possibly, in view of the nature of his duties re parades, that his particular case should be dealt with first. However, the executive felt that it should be a surprise, so it wasn't until the executive meeting Thursday night that the go ahead signal was given.

To ensure secrecy, it was decided to send out notices stressing the importance of the evening, but also keeping the members in the dark as to the exact nature of the evening. Jim Murphy, the entertainment convener, offered to cooperate by having a special roast beef dinner that night. He was the ONLY ONE, other than the actual executive, who knew what was the prime purpose of the evening.

At the conclusion of the business part of the meeting, the president, Harvey Garvin, asked the zone commander to introduce the guests of the evening. Representatives of the various branches in the zone were then introduced, and as well, what was referred to as the "mayors of Georgetown association" Harold Cleave, Joseph Gibbons and our present mayor John T. Armstrong.

Com. Shepherd who up until this point, had been kept completely unaware of the purpose of the evening, and had been kept down stairs to meet some highly mythical "important guests" who were about to arrive, was brought up to the auditorium by the sergeant at arms, and called to the platform by the chairman.

Com. Clark then gave to the members a short history of Henry's civic, military, and Legion activities. Long time chief of the fire brigade in town, as well as a veteran of both wars, and a winner of the Member of the Order of the British Empire, for services in World War II, he had become one of the best known soldiers in the district. He had also been connected actively with the regiment from the first war until 1940 when he went on active service. Com. Shepherd had been a valued member of the Legion for its twenty-eight years and had given excellent service. He was then presented with a set of miniature medals, a replica of the 10 ribbons he wears.

Mayor John T. Armstrong then was called on to speak, and paid tribute to him for his services to his country, county and more particularly our community. He said it had been a real privilege to march behind him in the numerous parades, and it was only a short time ago, when watching Com. Shepherd on parade, with a number of former senior officers in the regiment, that one lieutenant colonel had remarked as he watched him march by "There goes Canada's finest sergeant major." Mayor Armstrong said that on behalf of former mayors Cleave and Gibbons he was asked to express their sincere thanks for the service he had rendered to his community during both their terms as mayor, as fire chief, as well as the many joint Legion and municipal parades, etc. he had handled. The mayor closed with the thought that he hoped Henry would be spared for many years to head the various local parades, and that there was no finer family in Georgetown than his.

Com. Shepherd thanked the gathering, very feelingly, and said that the Legion had always been good to him, he appreciated and had a very warm spot in his heart for it. He was very grateful to his comrades for the honour they had done him, and thanked them from the bottom of his heart.

The meeting was then adjourned and a social evening was held in the lounge downstairs. Pictures of the recipient receiving his medals from the zone commander and of him with some of his fellow twenty five year men were taken, and it is hoped to use them in future issues of the Legionary, as well as this column.

As a matter of interest the ribbons he received in miniature are: M.B.E., 1914-18 ribbon, General Service Ribbon, 1914-1918, Victory ribbon, CVSM, General Service 1939-45, George V Jubilee, Coronation Medal Efficiency Decoration, and Long Service Medal.

The presentation was a complete surprise, and it was expressed by many of the members what a fine idea it had been. It also served to bring out more members to the regular monthly meeting than it has been our pleasure to see in a long time.
