He compared life in Trinidad with life in Canada, speaking on the cultural, social and spiritual levels. He spoke of the advancement of the Christian church there.

At the evening service, Mr. Dayfoot gave an illustrated address in place of the regular ser-

mon. Beautifully coloured slides showed life in Trinidad and the work of Sunday schools and local congregations. Pictures of old inadequate churches being torn down and imposing new ones being built were inspiring. New congregations are being established and new churches are being built by them as funds are available.
