**JUNIOR RAIDERS BOW  
TO PRESTON, 9-4**

Georgetown Juniors matched goal for goal with Preston for almost two periods and then faltered badly as the visitors slapped home four unanswered tallies in the third to humble the Junior hockey Raiders 9-4 in a hard fought contest at Georgetown Arena last Friday night.

Shultz had a field day at the expense of Lockhurst and Anderson, who shared Georgetown's goal-tending. The big right winger scored 5 of the 9 goals, one in each of the first two periods and then 3 inside of a minute and 20 seconds in the final stanza.

Georgetown outplayed Preston in the first twenty minutes but a couple of defensive lapses gave the visitors a 2-all tie at the end of the period.

Onorato put Preston out in front at 3:05 of the second on a pass from Fleischman but Georgetown managed to get this one back at 11:40 when Harrison took a pass from Dobbie and dumped it into the lower left hand corner after faking the goalie almost out of his skates.

Shultz and Aucoin teamed up to put Preston out in front to stay, Aucoin scoring from Shultz at 16:43 and then Shultz scoring what proved to be the winner with four seconds left in the middle period.

Georgetown opened the scoring in the last period, Charlton getting his second, this time from Dance. From there on in it was all Shultz as he rocked Georgetown back on their heels with his 3rd, 4th and 5th goals. Aucoin added the final touch for Preston at 17:21 with Moys getting the assist.

King, who broke his left arm in Preston on the previous Tuesday was a surprise starter for the injury ridden juniors. He played

with his arm in cast but still managed to hand out a couple of real knee-trembling body checks while turning in a creditable game.

The Georgetown defence was further crippled when Thompson had to leave the game for repairs in the 2nd period, after being cut over the left eye by a flying puck and Glen Dance fractured his wrist near the end of the game.

Jim Beckett, who has been kept out of action by a broken arm, has been working out since recently having the cast removed. He is expected back in the line-up shortly.

Charles Thomson, a councillor for five years, will become the first deputy-reeve of Nassagaweya Township next year.

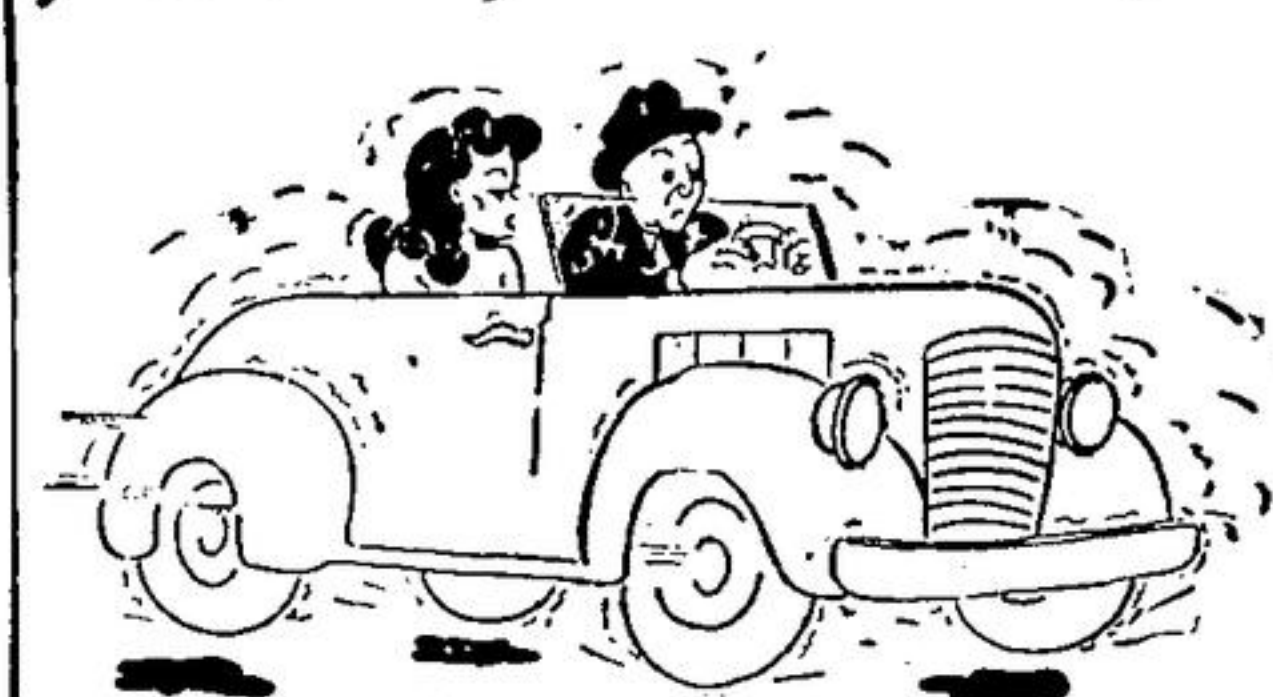
Township growth has been sufficient to allow the township a deputy for the first time in its history, to give Nassagaweya a second seat on county council.
