



MONTREAL'S PLACE VILLE-MARIE

This imposing plaza being built by Canadian National Railways in Montreal will form the centerpiece of a huge development rivaling New York's Rockefeller Center. Fountain, gardens and walks will turn the block-long area—Dorchester to Cathcart Streets at the foot of McGill College Avenue—into an attractive promenade. Raiders Blasted 10-4 by Oakville

Georgetown Raiders suffered their first home defeat at the hands of the Oakville Meteors last Friday night in Georgetown. After Raiders ran up a three nothing lead in the first eight minutes, they fell apart. While Oakville improved as the game progressed. In the third period Oakville scored six straight goals without a reply from Georgetown.

In the first period the Raiders started out very strong. Blake Inglis, Bill Chard and Frank Plashnik all scoring before the game was 8 minutes old. At this point Georgetown looked as if they were going to swamp their rivals. Oakville however, trouble getting the puck out of their own end. Finally Zaly got a break away at the 17:12 mark to make the score 3-1 as the period ended.

The Oakville team were very lucky to be only two goals down at this point. Very weak and erratic shooting by the Raiders, plus good goal tending by Dutch Holland kept them in the game. In the second period Oakville quickly tied the score on goals by Remick and Bishop. Lou Fawcett put the Raiders in front again at 17:51, but Oakville came roaring back to tie it up again 40 seconds later. From then on the Georgetown crew looked helpless.

At the 2:40 mark Divinsky scored the winner on a pass from Bishop. This took all the fight out of the Raiders, before the period ended, they rapped five more goals past Jack Rhodes, who was making his first start of the year for Georgetown. Penalties played a big part in this period with Raiders picking up seven to Oakville's two.

Although it is hard to find any stars (as the forwards refused to back check, and the defence kept getting caught up the ice) we would have to pick Frank Plashnik. While there seemed to be two Oakville men on him all night, he still picked up a goal and an assist. Jack Rhodes also played well for only having the benefit of one hour's practice this season. Five of the last six goals being scored on him on clean shots from about ten feet out. Incidentally, without a Raider within twenty feet of the Oakville players as they cruised around at will.

We hope the Raiders have gotten their bad game out of their system as they travel to Montreal on Friday night, for a total encounter. The next home game is Tuesday, December 18th with Elmira Polar Kings supplying the opposition. The Raiders defeated Elmira in their own rink the last time they met by a 3-2 count. So this coming Tuesday's game should be a dandy as the Polar Kings will be out for revenge.
