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PRESTON AGAIN WINS FROM TOWN JUNIORS

Preston Juniors handed Georgetown their second setback in their last two games, edging them 7-5 in a wide open affair in Preston's Memorial Auditorium last Friday, punctuated by eighteen penalties, nine of which were handed out in a wild third period.

Georgetown missed several chances to go home with a tie and possibly a win. Thompson shot wide after getting a break-away midway through the second and that just missed the target with a sizzler that had Preston goalie Proud beat all the way. Georgetown hit the goal post on three or four occasions while swarming around the Preston net.

Preston's major point getters, Aucoin and Schultz made the difference. Schultz again was the big gun with two goals and four assists, one more than Aucoin who scored twice and figured in three others.

Georgetown had the Preston fans worried for the first five minutes as they held the home team inside their own blue line and peppered screened shots at Proud. Finally Fleischman broke out for Preston. His pass in front of the Georgetown net to Aucoin was right on and Aucoin made no mistakes.

Bowman increased the lead at 10:05 from Schultz and Aucoin, while Beckett sat out a hooking penalty but with 15 seconds left in the period Hart put Georgetown back in the game, scoring from about 15 feet out on a pass from Pomeroy.

Preston struck early in the second period. Aucoin relayed Schultz' pass to Fogerty who rapped it home at the 1:50 mark to make it 3 to 1. Schultz continu-

ed to plague the Georgetown defense, intercepting a pass just inside the blue line and flipping to Eldred who tipped it in at 4:55. Georgetown looked stronger in the last few minutes of the second period after Hart stowed Schultz down to a walk with a check that made the high-scoring forward think twice before romping around the Georgetown blue line again with his head down.

Jim Beckett, playing his first game since having his arm out of a cast, scored at 17:16, one of the few times from there on in that both teams were full strength. Richardson and Harrison picked up assists on the tally which capped the scoring for the second period.

The Junior Raiders chopped Preston's lead to one goal at the start of the third when Thompson outgassed Proud at 4:15. Preston wasted no time in getting this one back, Aucoin scoring on a pass from Schultz at 4:48.

Schultz, evidently having shaken off the effects of that second period check, turned up with Aucoin and Kenzie to the winning and insurance goals at 9:01 and 14:27.

Georgetown's some back attempt had the Preston squad desperately hanging on and at times icing the puck to relieve the pressure.

Thompson scored at 15:20 and at 17:01 Charlton got the final goal of the hotly contested third period.

Tempers flared midway through the last stanza as Hyde tangled with Bowman and spent the next five minutes in the overcrowded sin bin. Dobbie let go with a verbal attack at referee Brethour which cost him a ten minute misconduct plus a game misconduct.

Three stars were chosen and awarded vouchers donated by Preston merchants. Aucoin and Schultz stood out for Preston and Charlton got the nod for Georgetown on the strength of his goal and two assists plus an all round fine game.
