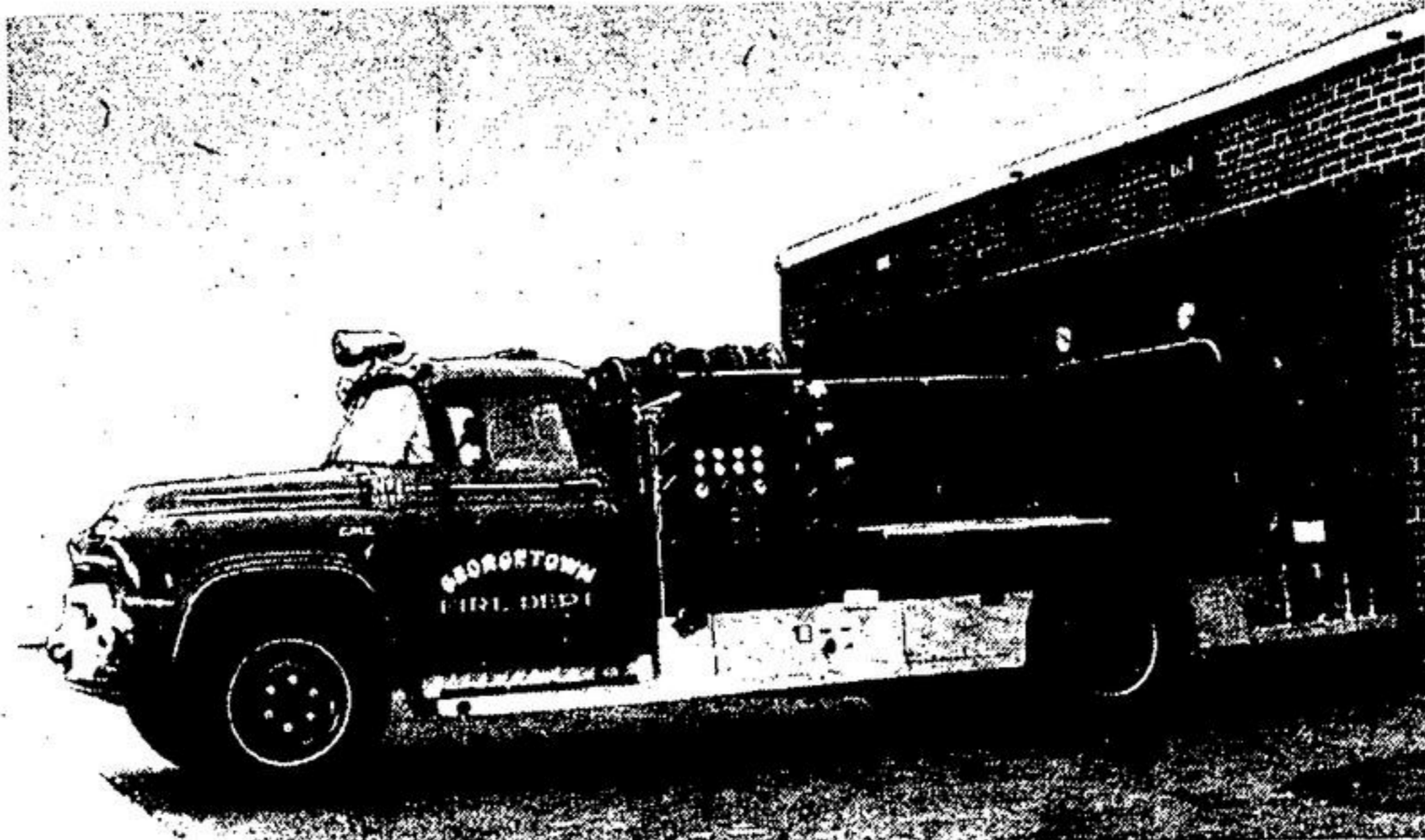

● **WHILE WE'RE ON THE** subject of Toronto newspapers, I'd like to draw your attention to an interesting article which appeared in the Globe and Mail a couple of weeks ago. It was an interview with Mrs. Dorothy Kaplan of the Oxford Picture Frame Company, Toronto, of which her brother-in-law, Mr. Perc Saxe, of Georgetown, is sales manager. . . . Perc commutes every day from his home here to the city. . . .

Everybody's interested in interior decorating to some extent these days, so it's not hard to realize there has been a great change in the framed picture market in recent years. The heavily ornamented gold of a few years ago is now almost completely out of favor, and the Oxford Picture Frame Company is constantly developing new ideas to keep up with decorating trends, said Mrs. Kaplan. For large pictures, for instance, there are wide shell mouldings that produce a shade box effect, as well as receding mouldings that bring the picture forward into the room. . . . Mats for smaller pictures have been designed in such interesting materials as antique mirror, linen, or burrap, the latter spray painted in a variety of dark colours to blend with current color schemes. An unusual treatment is the 'frame within a frame': a narrow moulding outlines the picture, followed by a wide mat and narrow outer frame. . . .

The article was accompanied by several illustrations of the latest innovations and styles in picture frames. . . .

Hope Harrison School Ready End-January

Harrison School, Georgetown's third public school located on Rexway Drive, is rapidly taking shape. The school board hopes that the building will be occupied the latter part of January. Contractor J. B. Mackenzie and Sons, Ltd., have now closed in the building and classrooms will be taking form this week. The building, originally planned for opening in September has been delayed by shortages of steel and glass, necessitating a "two-in-one" school operating in the Wrigglesworth school building, with each school operating a four-hour shift daily. 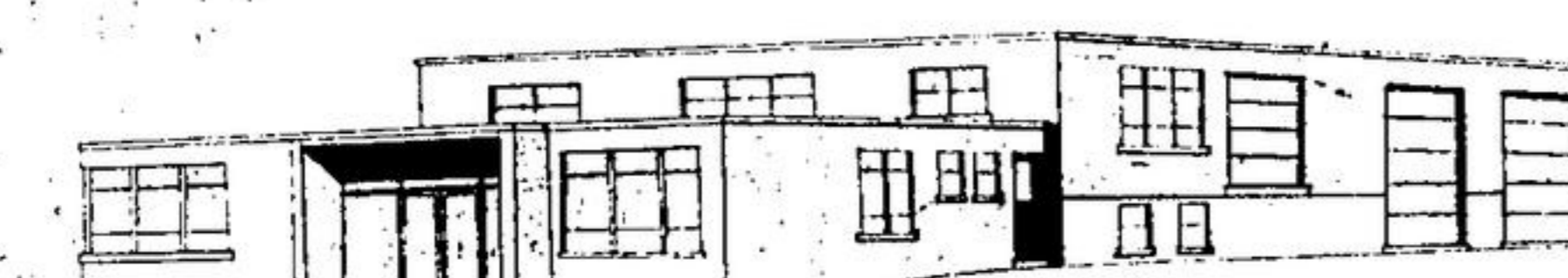
