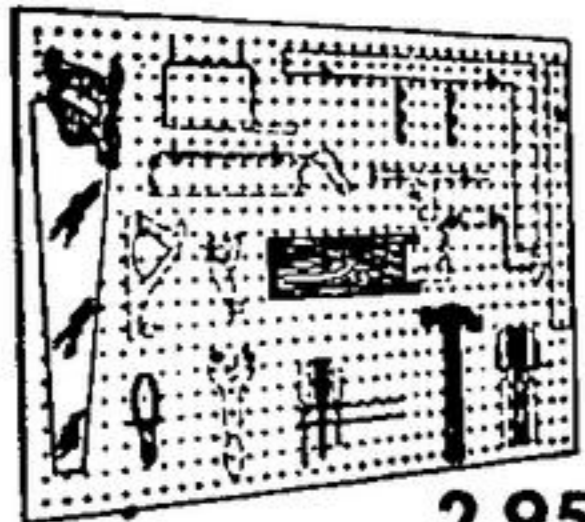

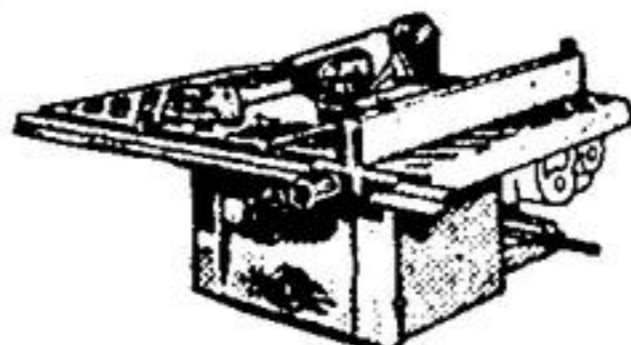

FARM NEWS

Debaters, Judging Team Honoured at Awards Night

Halton's annual 4-H awards night drew a packed auditorium at the Milton high school on Friday evening, November 30th. Under the chairmanship of A. T. Woodley, president of Halton's 4-H Agricultural club leaders' council, some one hundred and seventy-five 4-H club members were presented with their awards for completed projects in 1956. One of the many highlights of the evening was the presentation made by Warden Stan Allen, on behalf of the county of Halton, to Halton's Junior Farmer Inter-County Livestock Judging champions at the recent Royal.

The debating quartette who won the Provincial championship last spring were: Roy Ford, George Greenlees, Mac Sprowl, and Lloyd Vivian, while the winners of the Jeffrey Bull memorial trophy, emblematic of the inter-county livestock judging competition at the 1956 Royal were: Lynne Coulter, George Greenlees and Wm. C. Robinson — this latter team being coached by Art Bennett, associate agricultural representative for Halton and Peel counties. All six of the young men and Mr. Bennett were presented with engraved watches, by Warden Allen on behalf of the county. George Greenlees replied on behalf of the two championship teams.

The guest speaker, Clifford Waite of Lowville, who was introduced by Dawn Coulter, took as his theme "In Him Was the Life and the Life Was the Light of Men". Mr. Waite pointed out that for achievement there must be struggle and in participation we grow. Although, he stated, 50 per cent of our youth leave the farm, the things they learn in 4-H Club Work, help them in all phases of their life. Mr. Waite's dynamic message was ideal for the occasion, and the appreciation of the gathering was extended by Eleanor Joyce.

Musical numbers by Sylvia and Garry Tramples, accompanied by Arlene McArthur, added to the enjoyment of the evening's programme. The forty members of the Halton 4-H Holstein Calf Club were presented with their awards by club leader C. H. Lawrence, aided by Howard Armstrong and Mrs. Geo. E. Readhead, president and secretary respectively of the Halton Agricultural Society. Tom Hunter won the top award, and thereby received the R. C. Alexander's true type cow, and the Walter Duffray Trophy.

In the 4-H Beef and Dual Purpose Calf Club, in which 25 Club members completed, Lynne Coulter was the top member and was presented with the Katherine Merry trophy, emblematic of that honour. Club leader Sandy Buchanan ably handled the awards in this club. The 4-H Jersey-Guernsey calf club had 100 per cent competitors, and here Eleanor Joyce took the W. H. Duffray trophy, emblematic of the top award. The awards here were handled by club leader Ken Ella, and other special awards included the presentation of the Col. Bartley Bull special to Nora Beaty, and that made by president Wm. Featherstone of the Halton Jersey

Club, to Keith Ella. The Nelson Robinson specials to the 4-H Calf Club members with the top calves in five breeds were awarded as follows:

Holstein: Marilyn Leslie, Short-horn, Janet Hendershot; Dual Purpose, Harold Patterson; Jersey, Michael Jenkinson; Guernsey, Eleanor Joyce.

The fourth livestock club, the 4-H swine club, had thirteen completions. Here club leader Keith Merry announced the awards. Lynne Coulter also took top honours in this club, and thereby won the \$10 special donated by the Halton Hog Producers, which was presented by reeve A. R. Service.

Club leader Chas. McKeown announced the awards for the Acton 4-H grain club. Here James Aitken had the top award and thereby is the first winner of the Braida trophy. The awards in the 4-H First Year Grain Club, sponsored by the Esqueping Agricultural Society and the 4-H Second Year Grain Club, sponsored by the Halton Agricultural Society, were both ably handled by club leader John W. Pickel. In the Georgetown club, Allen Brownridge had the top award; and George Greenlees took a similar award in the club sponsored by the Halton Society.

In the absence of club leader Tom Foster, the awards in the 4-H Potato Club were announced by Art Bennett. Here the top club member was David Hume. This club, with Katherine Merry, as president, took the premier honours for the year and were presented with the Premier Club trophy.

The Nelson and Nasagaweya 4-H Tractor Club, sponsored by the Nelson Federation of Agriculture, had twelve of its members complete the year's project. Here the awards were announced by Club Leader A. P. Galloway. Ron Lee was the top winner among the tractor lads, and thereby won the Nelson Federation of Agriculture Special.

Among the many guests of the evening were: John Lloyd and two of his fellow committee members from the Kingsway Kiwanis, Toronto. Their Short Course Scholarship awards were won by Philip Shepherd, Bill Marshall, Allen Bowen, Ron Lee, David Hume, Mervyn Colling, Don Moffat, Sandy Barnes, Ross Austin, and George Greenlees.

This brief news article does not by any means do justice to the occasion nor to the 4-H club members, their club leaders, and the many individuals and organizations who contribute to the success of the programme. Halton may well be proud of her 4-H club members whose representative, Ross Austin, delighted everyone with his witty address of appreciation, at the conclusion of the evening's program which was so thoroughly enjoyed by club members and parents alike. Perhaps the pledge of 4-H club members everywhere, would be a fitting conclusion to this rambling account.

FARM NEWS

ALEXANDER JERSEY IS TOPS AS MILK PRODUCE

When glancing through a recent issue of the Canadian Jersey Breeder, we were interested to note several Halton Jersey cows were in the limelight. The top record was made by Rockbank Candos, a junior four year old, owned by Mac Alexander of Norval. In 365 days this great cow produced a total of 718

lbs. fat and 12,030 lbs. milk. G. S. Matthews and Son of Acton had a class leader among the junior three year olds, in 365 days in Jester Crystal Lily. Crystal Lily produced 10,301 lbs. milk and 511 lbs. fat. Ken Ella and Sons had two cows in the news — Rock Ella Aidan Blonde, as a senior three year old, in 305 days produced 8,551 lbs. of milk and 468 lbs. of fat — also a junior four year old, Lindale Success Sadie, in 305 days produced 461 lbs. fat. Then at the Lindale Farm of M. C. Beaty, we note Lindale Aidna Rose, a six year old, in 365 days with 556 lbs. butterfat and in the same class Lindale Lady Basilia as a ten-year old with 500 lbs. of fat. We were also interested to note Rockalda Volunteer Vivian, formerly owned by Arthur Padbury of Campbellville, and now in the herd of Don Head Farms at Richmond Hill. Vivian, as a fifteen year old, produce 538 lbs. of fat. As we recall, some ten or twelve years ago, Vivian and her full sister used to be the winning progeny of dam for Art Padbury at the Milton Fair.

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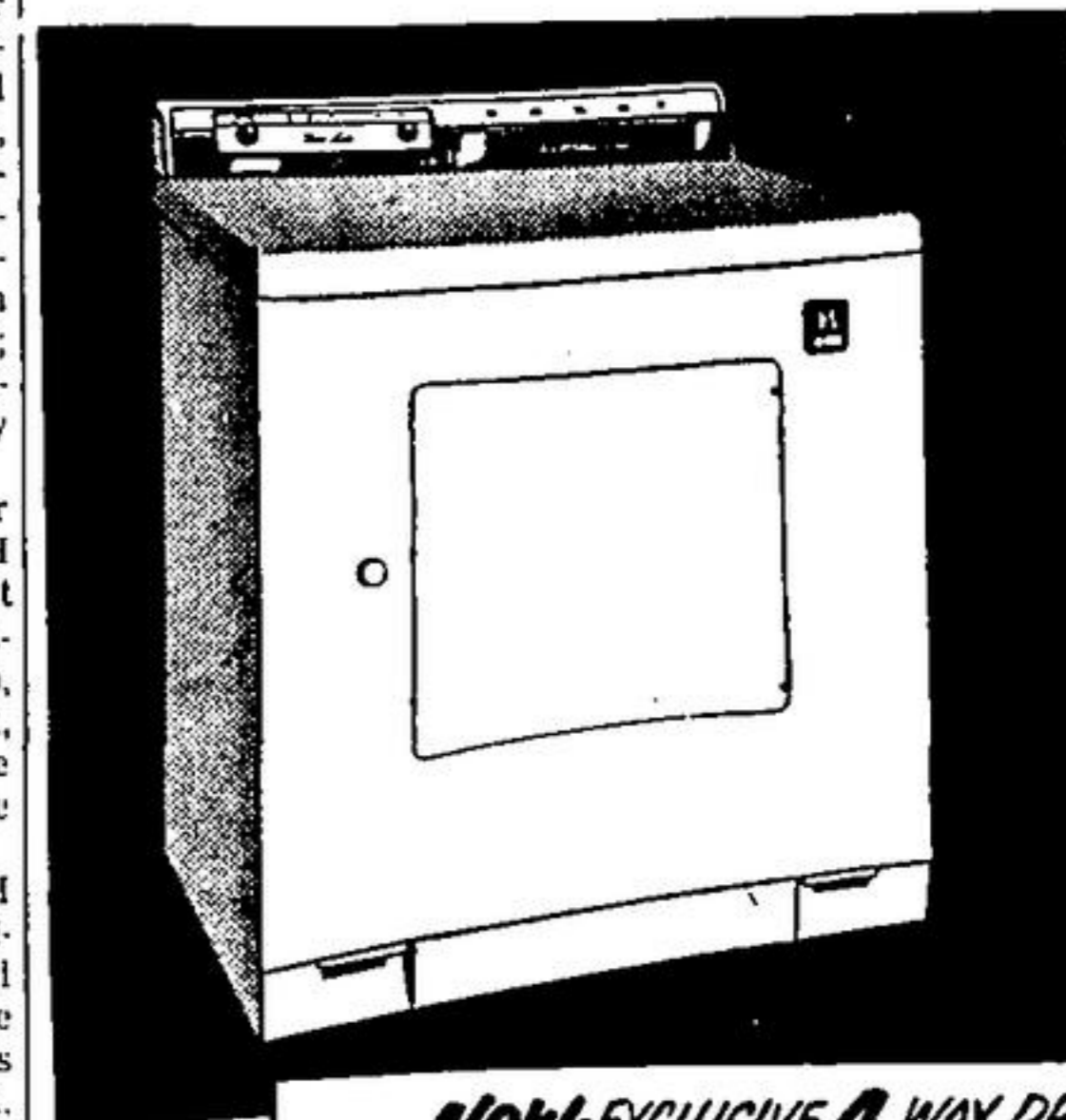
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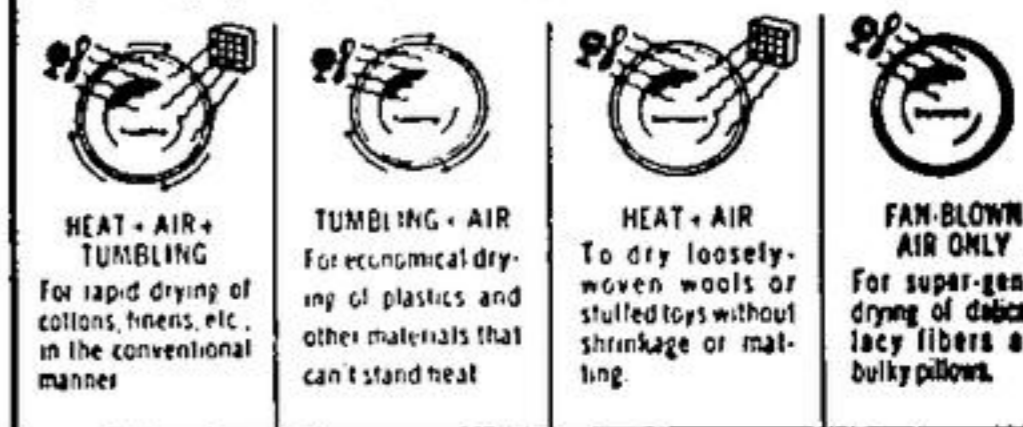
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
