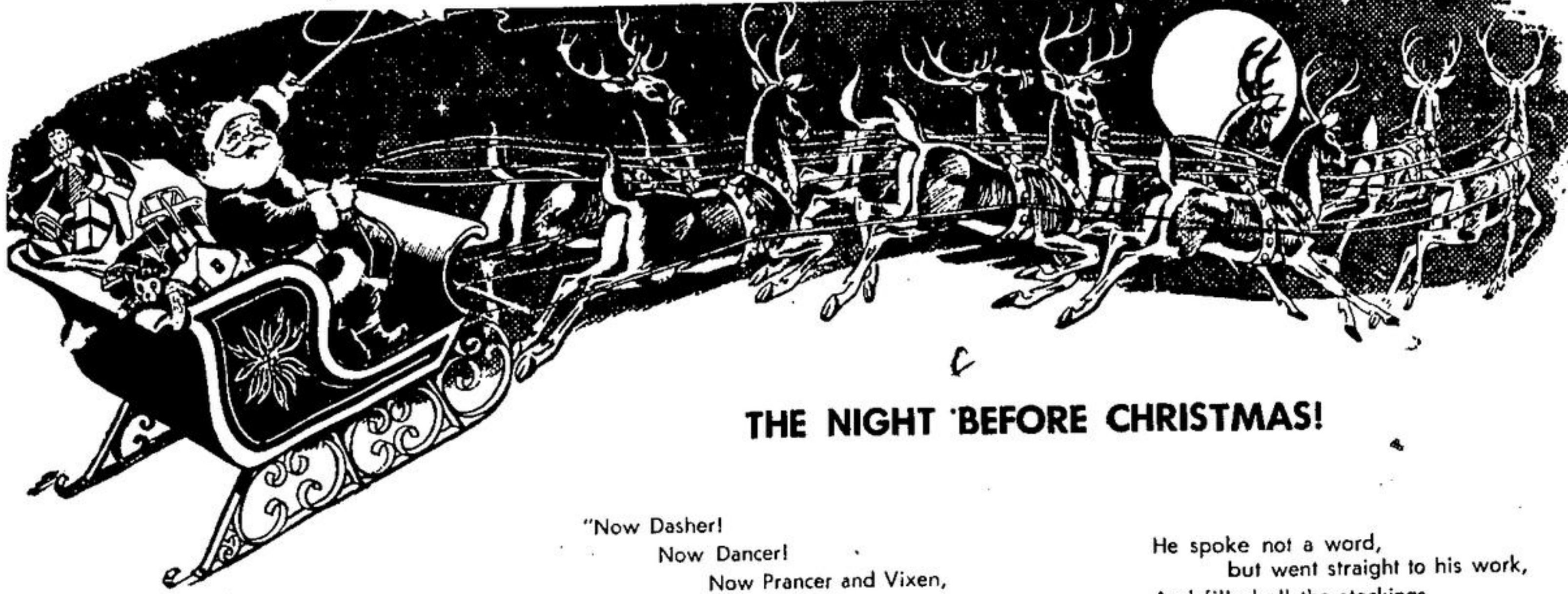

Alliston Holstein Butterfat Champion

A Canadian Holstein cow, who in her life time has won many honors for production, has crowned her achievements by establishing a new championship record for lifetime production of butterfat. The lifetime title is the most coveted of all dairy production awards.

The new champion is Montvic Colleen Abhekerk, owned by J. J. E. McCague, Alliston. In ten lactations she has produced 228,753 lbs. milk, (90,701 quarts) containing 9,861 lbs. butterfat. Colleen's ten 365 day records averaged 986.1 lbs. fat, which is a lifetime performance never equalled by any other cow in the world. (Lifetime totals on herd test in USA and Britain include credits for production beyond 365 days and previous to the next calving, but in Canada all records are terminated at 365 days.)

Colleen has been milked three times daily throughout her lifetime with the exception of one lactation when she was milked twice daily. Every milking has been weighed, and all her records have been made on official Record of Performance test supervised by the Canadian Department of Agriculture.

In addition to her overall lifetime Championship, Colleen is the Canadian Champion for butterfat production for eight, nine, and ten lactations regardless of times milked daily, and for seven lactations on three times a day milking. It is believed that some of these are also World records, but figures are not available for an accurate check.
