## Santa Parade has Floats Fun, Candy for Kiddies

Some 1300 bags of candy were distributed by Santa Claus on Saturday at Georgetown's annual community Christmas tree which the Lions Club has sponsored for the past quarter century.

Last year the parade was augmented with a number of floats, and this year response to the efforts of Dick Riddall and his parade committee was even better. The parade now seems firmly established as a No. 1 attraction.

A pouring rain all morning failed to dampen enthusiasm, and a lucky break in the weather in the early afternoon saved paraders the misery of proceeding in the rain. The public turned out in larger numbers than ever, and the route from Windsor Dr. up the highway was crowded while downtown Georgetown was filled with spectators.

The parade was headed by:

parade Queen Sandra Scott, who rode with Mayor Jack Armstrong, Warden Stan Allen and Stan Hall, M.P.P. The Brampton Lorne Scots Pipe Band provided music, along with the Brampton Clown Band. Many floats had a nursery rhyme motif, including The Old Woman in the Shoe, entered by the town; Little Red Riding Hood, Union Local 788 (Smith & Stone); Alice in Wonderland, the Girl Guides; Three Little Pigs, Rotary Club; Queen of Hearts, Union Local 474 Alliance Paper; and the Snow Queen, Beaver Ready Mixed Co.

Georgetown Hunters & Anglers association had an attractive float depicting a hunting scene. Beaver Lumber Co. built their float around Smokey the Bear, with several beavers drawing attention to the company name. The Lions Club float depicted Toyville and the North Pole.

An attention getter was an en-

try from Union Local 481 (Provincial Paper) which showed the Bilgewater Dairy. The perfect replica of a milk wagon had the horse riding inside, and was followed by a hilarious cow and an ostrich, while several fancy dressed milkmen amused the crowd with their antics.

The parade was completed with floats from Erin Lions Club, Mr. Fix-It (Jim Mulholland), a police safety car, clowns and a front-end loader from the fire department, and the big attraction, Santa Claus on his handsome reindeer float.

Four silver cups had been donated for best floats, two by Carling Breweries and one each by the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. Prize-winners in the various divisions were Provincial Paper, Industrial, Girl Guides, social, Rotary, clubs; and Beaver Lumber, commercial.

Dave Irons notched the winner in the overtime on a nice play at 6:24 to give the Raiders their third straight win over the Polar Kings.
