Disturbed about repeated traffic tie-ups in stormy weather near Norval, Reeve C. Carman Core Brampton last week sponsored a move by Peel County Council to overcome the chronic condition.

On a motion of Mr. Core, seconded by Deputy-Reeve Fred cided to petition the Minister of Highways to set up a different system of sanding in the area. The petition suggests that "a stock-pile of sand be placed at the bottom of the hill and a trucker in the village of Norval be hired to look after these hills."
