## JUNIORS FORGE AHEAD BEAT PRESTON 12-5

The Georgetown Juniors, who have had a little trouble convincing the Preston hockey club and their followers they are worthy of top spot in the four-team league, converted a lot of the doubters Friday night, December 21st when in the first period they erupted for three goals in 47 seconds and then rapped home nine more throughout the course of the game to down Preston 12 to 5 at Georgetown arena.

Ken Richardson working with the reunited trio of Cunningham, Pomeroy and Richardson scored three of the six goals attributed to the CPR line and pocketed another while out on a jumbled line early in the 2nd stanza. With King and Dance back in action Georgetown iced their healthiest team since the league opener three weeks ago.

The Junior Raiders were passing well and as a result completing their plays; something they failed to do in the previous contest at Preston. Georgetown's employment of three lines, each with high-scoring potential, enabled coach Bob Hume to have a fresh, fast-skating line on the ice for the full sixty minutes.

Preston on the other hand, relying on the scoring power of their two leaders Aucoin and Schulz, were burning on only one engine Friday as Schulz sat this one out.

In searching for a substantial reason for the trouncing, Preston need not look at the penalty department. Georgetown drew 15 of the 25 handed out by referee Brethauer who must have felt like Santa Claus by the time the game ended.

Cunningham touched off the scoring rash that put Preston on the ropes early in the game when he tipped in a shot that King let from the blue line and five seconds later made it 2-0 on a pass from Ken Richardson. At 5:13 it was the same pair again—this time Richardson doing the scoring from about five feet out.

With the second period one minute and 38 seconds old, Cunningham found Richardson with a pass in front of the Preston goal for his second tally of the night.

Harrison contributed to the landslide, relaying Black's pass to Ken Richardson who beat Proud on a quick wrist shot at 4:15 to clinch his hat trick. Bowman, shifted to centre in place of

## Gas Test Shows Over Half Million Daily

Early in December, officials of Anthony Gas & Explorations were jubilant when their No. 12 gas well came in with terrific force on the farm of J. G. (Goldie) Gillies on No. 15 Sideroad.

They were optimistic that the well could supply a city the size of Guelph. Last week, the official test of the well confirmed their optimism. The test showed a capacity of 546,000 cubic feet of gas per day.

Meanwhile, at No. 11 well on the Harry Brown farm, it is hoped that another large cache of gas may be discovered. While drilling there last week, a pocket of gas was found 500 feet from the surface which almost blew the drill out of the hole. Gas is rarely found so close to the surface, and there was great surprise at the discovery.
