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**ASKS FARMERS PROVIDE REFUGEE ACCOMMODATION**

Ontario farmers have been asked to help provide temporary accommodation for Hungarian refugees coming into Ontario. The appeal to Ontario farmers was made by Lloyd Jasper, President of the 100,000 farmer-member Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

"Some 6,000 Hungarian refugees are expected in Ontario by January 10th," Mr. Jasper said. "It is as much the responsibility of Ontario farm people as it is the responsibility of Ontario cities and towns to help these brave people secure a foothold in Canada."

"Notices are going out to all our country federations of agriculture to urge the farmers in their areas to provide temporary accommodation in their homes for Hungarian refugees, regardless of whether or not these people are farm workers," Mr. Jasper said. "Naturally, we are pleased to note that in some groups that have already arrived as many as 10% are farm workers," he added, "and we are hopeful that farmers will avail themselves of this new labour supply."

Mr. Jasper is urging all Ontario farmers who can offer temporary accommodation, even if only until the spring, to contact immediately the secretary of their county federation of agriculture. The secretary, in turn, will report the information to the Toronto head office of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture.

Mr. Jasper indicated that the Ontario Federation of Agriculture had conferred with authorities in Toronto who are responsible for the placing of Hungarian refugees. These authorities, he said, were pleased with the Federation's plans to attempt to locate accommodation in rural Ontario for some of the refugees.
