GOALIE, WELL NAMED AS PROUD TURNS BACK JRS.

PRESTON 4 — GEORGETOWN 1

A short, blond, Preston net minder with the decorous name of Proud had reason to be just that last Friday, December 28th, after turning aside Georgetown's hardest shots for the better part of the sixty minutes to give Peston a 4-1 decision over the Junior Raiders at Georgetown Memorial Arena.

Beckett was Georgetown's only marksman breaking the charm late in the final session to save the Juniors, the highest scoring club in the league, from being shut out. Georgetown pressure coupled with some weak forechecking on Preston's part gave Proud his chance to take up the slack which he did in brilliant fashion. Georgetown's ability to keep the puck inside the Preston line, even when short-handed, had fans glancing at the sin bin to see just who had the man advantage.

The first period was very fast, as play shuttled between the two blue lines. Preston had their chance to take an early lead when Aucoin had Anderson, who was handling Georgetown's goal tending chores, at his mercy after walking right around the defence. Anderson got a skate on the shot which finally trickled wide of the open corner.

After the elapse of about five minutes Georgetown's sharp passing started to pay off. Preston were pushed back and held in their own zone while the wings dug the puck out of the corners and kept a stream of passes flowing back to the point.

The defense were guilty of some weird shooting at times but when their shots were right on the target Proud was right there.

Attempted rushes by Preston died before crossing centre ice. Thompson missed one of the best Georgetown scoring opportunities with two minutes remaining in the period when he picked up a stray pass and skated in all alone to test Proud from close range. The Preston netminder just steered it to the side.

It looked like the session would end scoreless until Bill Bowman broke into the clear after taking a pass from Schulz. The fourteen year old left winger let a slap shot go from ten feet out at 19:25 that Anderson had no chance on.

At the end of the period a fight broke out between Ron Bowman and Ken Richardson in the north end of the rink. Cunningham got into it and three watched the first five minutes of the second period from the cooler.

Bowman was the only one that enjoyed the show as Preston, taking advantage of the extra elbow room struck for two quick goals before Georgetown could get untangled.

Aucoin tapped the first one behind Anderson on a solo rush at the 2:40 mark and fifteen seconds later it was the same big number 14 who set Schindler up in front at the Georgetown cage after taking Schulz's pass, to give Preston their three goal lead.

Preston started to run into some penalties which could have cost them the game had it not been for Proud. Georgetown peppered shots at the net from all angles but time and again the steady Preston goalie came up with the puck.

Georgetown's eagerness to blink the light cost them a goal in the final period. When Preston finally did get a three man rush organized there was only one man back. Bowman had no one near him when he raked in Fogarty's pass midway through the stanza and picked the short side for the Paley-4th and his second tally of the night.

Georgetown footers finally got their chance to exercise their vocal chords when Beckett broke the balloon at 11:45. Richardson in an attempt to fake Proud to one side skated right by the left side of the net. His quick back-hand pass was right on Beckett's stick and after almost 52 minutes of play Georgetown got on the score sheet. Their attempts to add to it in the eight minutes remaining got nowhere and it ended Preston 4 - Georgetown 1.

The loss was the third for the Junior Raiders in four clashes with Preston but in defeat Georgetown, showed some of their best hockey and had a definite edge in play. The Juniors are sponsored by Maxwell Motors, Jack O'Lantern, Harrison's Garage and Hewson Motors and with better game attendance have the potential to put Georgetown on the junior hockey map.
