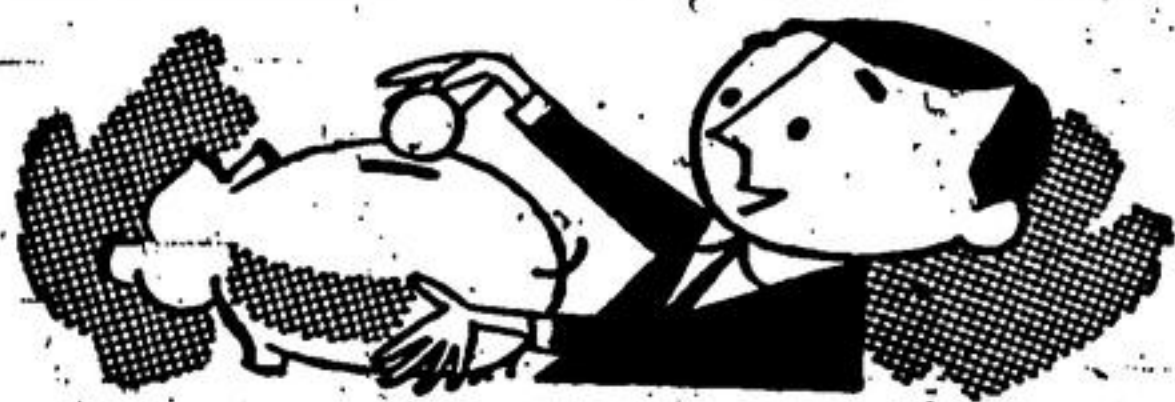

CHARLTON, HART STAR JUNIORS TRIM ELMIRA

GEORGETOWN 11 — ELMIRA 5

Charlton fattened his point leadership, Hart continued to pace the defencemen in that department and King took possession of the penalty box as Georgetown Juniors blasted Elmira 11-5 Friday night, January 4th at Georgetown Arena.

The Elmira Club stayed in contention for two periods and then faded out of the picture as the Jr. Raiders counted six times in the final session to take the six goal lead.

Penalties, the only black mark on the crowd pleasing type of hockey displayed in the Junior league, again had the officials working overtime. Brethour handed out 19 sentences, 11 of which were served by Georgetown Players. King monopolized the cooler with two minors, a fighting major and a ten minute misconduct.

Elmira was only able to take advantage of four of the penalties as Georgetown showed some of their best hockey while shorthanded and threatened to score on several occasions.

Thompson got the first one for Georgetown after just 38 seconds of play from a scramble in front of the Elmira net. Charlton and Hart were awarded assists but just about everybody had a whack at the puck before it got by Bueller. Hart's deflected slap shot from the blue line at 6:50 cushioned the lead as Bauman of Elmira sat out a kneeling penalty.

At 16:22 Bushert let a shot go from 20 feet out that caught the upper right hand corner behind Lockhurst as Georgetown got a little sloppy with their backchecking. Brubaker set up the goal that put Elmira even when he hit the goal post after grabbing off a Georgetown pass aimed at nobody in particular. The rebound came right out onto the stick of Reger who just had to tap it into the open corner.

The celebrations were short lived however as Doug Richardson lifted the Junior Raiders into the lead from which they were never headed when he blinked the light at 18:32 after taking a pass from Harrison to make it 3-2 at the end of the period.

It was the same line that opened the scoring at 1:55 of the second stanza. This time it was Heckelt on the scoring end and Richardson and Harrison picking up assists.

The play started to get ragged around the five minute mark. Elmira were allowed to romp unmolested around the Georgetown cage but some erratic shooting nullified any scoring threats. Ken Richardson, who has acquired the knack of being in the right place at the right time, capped a Georgetown attack by slapping Pomeroy's pass behind Bueller to make it 5 to 2 at the 8:30 mark.

At 11:44 Danck drew a tripping penalty that gave Elmira the spark to get back in the game. Bushert showed the way at 12:55, getting his second tally of the contest with Brubaker picking up his second assist and 10 seconds later with the same a full strength Bushert got credit for his third on a knee-high shot that Lockhurst misjudged.

With one minute remaining in the second period, King and Deunch decided they hated each other and engaged in a short round of fistcuffs behind the Elmira net. The pair received five minute majors for their trouble.

The teams were five a side when Harrison touched off Georgetown's biggest scoring period with what proved to be the winner at 2:55 of the last stanza. Ken Richardson picked up the assist by feeding to Harrison from behind the cage. Harrison just flipped it over Bueller, who went to his knees in an attempt to block the shot.

Ken Richardson and Cunningham teamed up for the next two tallies. Cunningham relayed Auger's pass to Richardson who rapped it home from close in at 6:40 and at 13:40 with Reger off Cunningham poked Richardson's pass into an open corner on a play sparked by Pomeroy.

With Snider sitting out a cross-checking penalty Duce put Georgetown into a 5 goal lead, scoring their 9th tally at 15:07 from Charlton and Hyde. Elmira's only answer to the barrage came at 17:55 when Bowman scored while the Jr. were two men short.

Charlton showed how he stays on top of the scoring heap with a two goal outbreak, bulging the twine behind Bueller at 18:45 and again ten seconds later. The goals, both assisted by Danck and Thompson, were his 10th and 11th of the schedule.
