

Acton Juniors Upset Locals In Game 5-3

Acton Juniors revelled in Georgetown's weakness last Friday night, upsetting the Jr. Raiders 5-3 on Acton ice while two hundred fans roared their approval. Neither team looked spectacular in the contest, the first for the J.R.s on natural ice.

Georgetown looked tired after only five minutes of play. They passed without looking and had difficulty in generating more than 4 or 5 real passes throughout the entire game. Acton, though vastly improved since their last outing, showed very little to account for the win. Concentrating on checking, the Blueshirts took two periods to recover from their surprise at Georgetown's willingness to let them have the pill and looked uncertain when they did get it.

Playing without the services of Doug Richardson, third in the scoring race, Cunningham, who has picked up eight points in only five games, and King, the Junior Raiders showed only flares of their previous strength.

Harrison put Georgetown into a temporary lead at 10.15 of the first, slapping home Beckett's pass from the side after Dobbie blocked an Acton's clearing pass at the blue line. Coxe got that one back when Black fed him a pass as he crossed the blue line as Georgetown got caught with only one man back.

The J.R.s were anything but cautious, when they were in front of their own net. Their attempts to relieve the pressure when short handed were weak and several times amounted to nothing more than passes back to the point.

Acton had five men to Georgetown's four when Barter made it 2-1 with one minute remaining in the period. From there on in Georgetown could do no better than draw even.

Thompson tied it up briefly at the 11.40 mark of the second stanza, scoring his eighth of the season on a pass from Danca while Barter sat out a tripping penalty. The deadlock stood up for little more than a minute however as Acton pushed Georgetown back into their own zone and peppered shots at the net from all angles, which amazed the Acton players as much as anyone.

Barter's drive from directly in front of the target at 14.05 was the tie-breaker. Hall and Cook also had a hand in it. Still marvelling at their new found strength, the Actonites paid no attention to Georgetown's anemic checking efforts and waltzed around the defense almost at will as the puck seemed glued to their sticks.

The Junior Raiders took another rush at the lead in the third period when Pomeroy took a pass from Tucker and skated down the left boards to make it 3 all and complete the only scoring play of the night that actually looked planned.

Barter broke it up at 9.55 with his third goal of the game while the Juniors were a man short; Hall picking up his third assist. Not only were Acton convinced they were the league leaders, Barter was beginning to think he was Schulz.

Georgetown's lines, jumbled because of the absences, started to click midway through the final session and for a while it looked as if they would even up again, but most of their shots hit the sprawling Acton defense.

Hall, still picking up assists, passed to Coon for the clincher at 13.30 to give Acton their 2-goal lead, which they still had at the final bell.

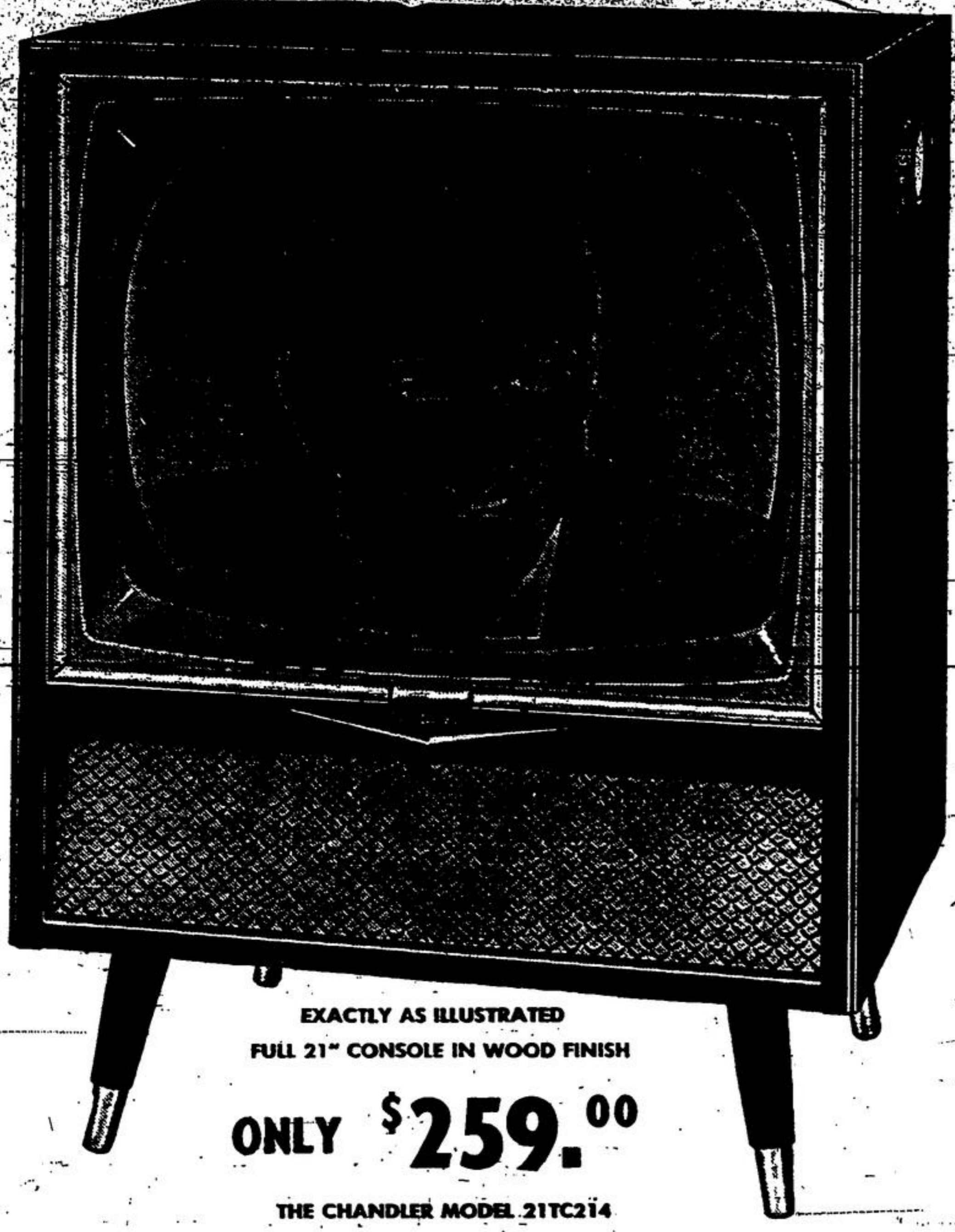
NEEVE, DEPUTY ARE HOSTS AT DINNERS

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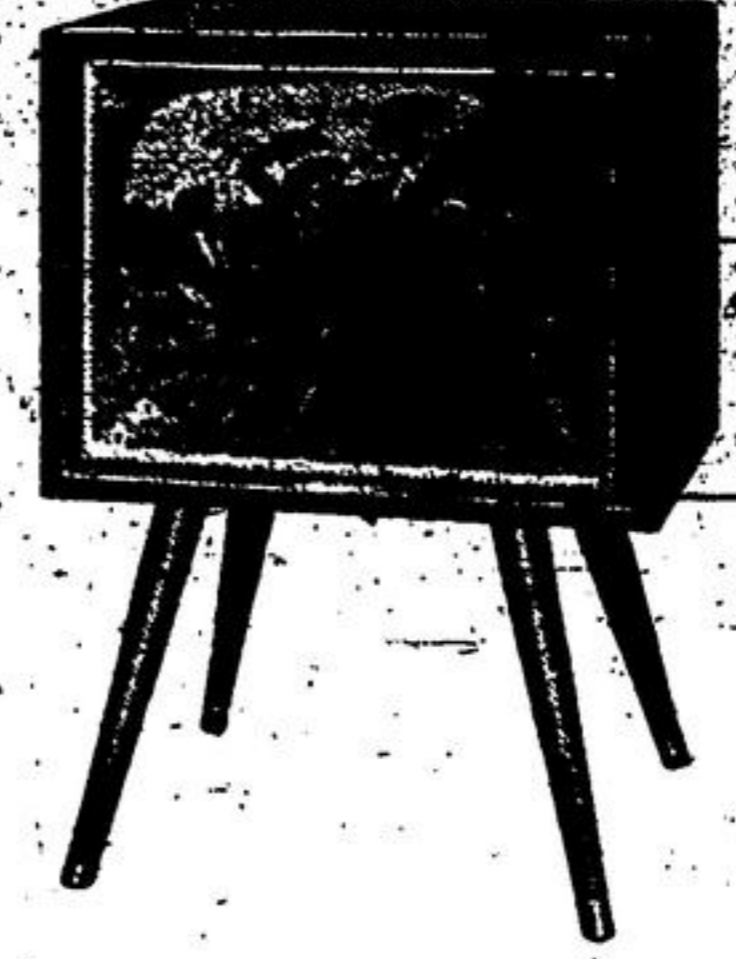


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
