The tractor, owned by Lane's Haulage, was badly charred both inside and out as a result of the blaze which was believed to have started from a backfire. Gas which leaked onto the frozen ground was also ignited from the heat of the flames.

Firemen were called to the second blaze of a similar nature on Monday when a car caught fire while parked in the driveway of one of the new subdivision homes.

The blaze originated when a light-bulb in an over-night heater exploded setting fire to the engine which in turn ignited the underpart of the dashboard. Wires leading from the ignition and other parts of the dash were destroyed by the heat.

The prompt arrival of the firemen kept the flames from spreading to the upholstery where more serious damage could have been done. The car is owned by Mr. C. W. Smith, 27 Prince Charles Drive.

## HALTON FARM GROUP INVESTIGATES WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION

D. H. Brawley, of the Workmen's Compensation Board, and L. Morris, of the British American Assurance Company, were the speakers at a meeting sponsored by the Halton Farm Management Ass'n in Milton on Tuesday evening of last week.

To date stated Mr. Brawley, only 2300 Ontario farmers have availed themselves of this protection for their employees and themselves.

In this day and age of mechanized equipment, farming is a hazardous occupation. We were therefore surprised to learn that such a low percentage of our farm operators are protecting themselves against accidents which could easily cost the employer his entire assets.

The speaker cited the case of two farm workers, fortunately both covered by Workmen's Compensation, one of whom cost the Board a total of \$27,325.92, and the other \$16,365.75. In the first case, the worker got his arm caught in a baler, as a result of which the arm had to be amputated.

It is our opinion that no farm operator, whether he hires labour for the odd day, a week, a month or by the year, can afford to be without this protection which can be secured at cost. At the same time the farmer can also protect himself and other members of the family against accidents occurring in the operation of the farm business. The cost, varies with the occupation—the rate is \$2.00 for each \$100 of the labour bill paid in the year.

This provides compensation until the worker can resume his occupation; takes care of medical aid, and where necessary will provide a pension for life, and further relieves the employer of any financial responsibility.

We would strongly urge Halton farm operators to investigate this source of protection against farm accidents, which unfortunately are becoming all too common. Don't wait until you have an accident. For full information write the Workmen's Compensation Board, Harbour St., Toronto.

All types of farm insurance, was the subject of the enlightening address of L. Morris. That the group of farm operators were keenly interested was substantiated by lengthy discussion following the addresses of both speakers.

In fact the discussion continued long after the meeting adjourned at the end of the two hour session. We understand that another open meeting is being sponsored by the same group on Tuesday evening, February 12th, when the topic under discussion will be Farm Income Tax and the Basic Herd Policy.

## ATTEMPT DIRECTION OF HOG MARKETING

In an effort to strengthen the Ontario Hog Producers' Marketing Scheme, an attempt is being made by the officials of the Ontario Hog Producers' Association, to have at least 50% of Ontario hogs marketed on the Public Stock Yards.

Until recently approximately 95% of the Ontario hogs were going direct to the processors' plants. Since this program was undertaken the percentage going to the Public Stock Yards has increased to around 20%. According to Charles McInnis, president of the Ontario Hog Producers' Association, who addressed four meetings in Halton recently, "for the first time in the history of this province, despite heavy marketings, we got an increased price for our hogs in mid-December."

This, he attributed to the processors having to compete for their full requirements with one another on the public market. It was our privilege to hear Mr. McInnis at two of the four meetings, and it is our opinion that he presented some very logical arguments in support of the idea of marketing a larger percentage of our hogs on the public stock yards.

Personally we fail to see how the idea can lose the producer anything, so we would suggest that every Halton producer try out Mr. McInnis' idea for a year—that is, all Halton hogs to go to the Public Stock Yards.

## HOWARD GOODENOW HAS UNDERWOOD OFFICIAL

A. Howard Goodenow, a native of Georgetown and a retired official of the Underwood Typewriter Co., was buried in Greenwood Cemetery Thursday morning. Burial followed funeral service at the Turner and Porter Chapel, Toronto.

Mr. Goodenow, a descendant of United Empire Loyalists, spent his boyhood in town, when his family lived in the Main St. house now owned by Elmer Thompson. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Goodnow, and his father was once Georgetown's postmaster.

Unmarried, his closest relatives are niece Mrs. H. Slater, Toronto and Mrs. C. W. Moffatt, Denver, Colorado, and a nephew, Howard Jermyn, Toronto.

He died at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, on January 7th.
