Christmas Mail Heaviest Ever Town's History

The heaviest Christmas mail in Georgetown's history was received and despatched this year at the local post office.

According to figures compiled by Postmaster Harold Marshall, over 100,000 greeting cards were mailed and over 3,000 parcels were received during the Christmas rush.

Sales of 2c stamps, which increased by 20,000 at Christmas time 1955 had a similar increase this year.

Mailing was complicated this year by the day on which Christmas day fell, a Tuesday. Normally, some 50,000 cards would be mailed by mid-December, but this year less than 10,000 had been despatched by December 15th.

This caused a tremendous bottleneck on the Monday and Tuesday, December 17-18 which were the peak days for both incoming mail and local mailing, and left only six days to process the whole Christmas rush.

Mr. Marshall, his staff of seven and six extra holiday helpers worked many long hours keeping up with the tremendous volume of mail.

Permanent staff members who shared in the work were Frances Deans, Jim Collier, Blake Inglis, Fanny Weaver, Delmar French, Jean Hancock and Jim Vander Voort. Mr. VanderVoort has since left the post office for a new job in the Dixie Cup plant in Brampton, and his position is filled by Gordon Hallitt, 11 Gibbons Place.
