BALLINAFAD

CHALLENGING MESSAGE BY INDIA SPEAKER

A great challenging message was brought to the people of Ballinafad church on Sunday morning by the Rev. Daniel Pattia of India. He gave many enlightening and thought-provoking illustrations of the results of missionary efforts by the United Church of Canada among his own people but went on to say that 98 per cent of the population or 400 million still needed the Christian message brought to them. The first missionaries went into Northern India 79 years ago, but he explained that his country was one of great extremes and changes were enacted very slowly. There are 30 million languages and this is also one of the great problems.

His message to the children in the morning was the story of his own life and how he was left an orphan, being educated at the missionary school with the help from Mission Bands in Canada. Among 400 boys at a school he attended, he was the only Christian and so did not have many friends until he became a cham-

ption in sports, and this was God's way of using him to encourage other young people to live the Christian way.

The evening service was of an informal nature with Rev. Pattia answering questions about his native land. He did not want us to pity his people, but rather to help them because of the love for Jesus Christ within ourselves. At the morning service Mrs. N. Sinclair, Mr. and Mrs. E. McEnery and Mr. Neelon sang "My Jesus I Love Thee." In the evening the choir sang a suitable anthem and Mrs. Black and Mr. Neelon sang two duets and the congregation enjoyed a sing song of old favourite hymns.
