JUNIORS STILL SUPERIOR

The Junior Raiders, working on their sixth win of the schedule, snowed Elmira under with a seven goal storm in the third period on Tuesday night, January 23rd, in another basement boys 93, at Georgetown Arena, the third victory for the J.R.s in as many games together between the two clubs.

Playing their first game under the trained eye of their shifty new coach Rene Martin, the Georgetown crew looked a little shaky in the first two periods against the team they had walked over twice before by scores of 10-3 and 11-5. After the first twenty minutes of play it was knotted at 2-2 and despite some labelled shots by both clubs in the middle period the session went scoreless.

It was an entirely different story in the third. Beuller in the Elmira net saw pucks coming at him for the rest of the night and as the scoreboard indicated not all of them hit him.

Charlton and Thompson, two names usually said in the same breath, combined for the game opener after just half a minute of action, to climax a quick surge of Georgetown power that carried the play into the Elmira zone right from the face-off.

In fighting back for the equalizer the visitors seemed a little reluctant to skate right in on goal. In most cases, the puck-carrier launched his drive just after crossing the red line. What ever the strategy was, it probably would have been improved if the shots had been on the net.

Bowman finally did find the target at 15:08, Bushert picking up the assist. Three and a half minutes later Harrison beat Beuller on a solo effort reminiscent of a Junior Beaumont play two years back. The his scoring first year forward who is breathing down Charlton's neck in the point totals, intercepted a pass at the Elmira blue line, swooped in from the left boards and backhanded it into the net after teasing the young goaler out of his crease with just enough stick-handling as he crossed the goal mouth.

Moder got that one back for Elmira, slapping one under a kneeling Lockhurst after the Georgetown netminder went down to block Dalmers drive from close range. The goal came at the 19 minute mark while Auger was serving an interference penalty.

A couple of temper flare ups and some great goal tending on the part of Lockhurst were the only bright spots in an otherwise uneventful 2nd period. The J.R.s saved their big punch for the third.

It was Hart that touched off the explosion. His dash in from the blue line at 1:46 after taking Cunningham's pass back to the point set the example for an avalanche of tallies of the flashy variety. Ken Richardson bagged what proved to be the winner at the 2:50 mark, when Cunningham relayed Pomeroy's pass out in front of the net, and Pomeroy picked up one for himself at 4:10. Cunningham again getting a hand in it.

Beckett's goal at 5:30, a hard rising shot from 15 feet out, came with the teams five a side and lifted Georgetown into a four goal lead. Charlton added to it for the second time in the contest, after Dobbie started out from the corner. Elmira put in their rebuy bid at 14:40, grabbing Dancer's rebound of the post and swarming into the Georgetown end where they bagged their third of the night on a sizzler that Lockhurst had no chance on. Bushert and Dalmers got the assists on the tally that was credited to Moder.

Georgetown's 8th goal almost wasn't. Thompson in trying to drift one into an almost open net from just outside the crease tied himself in knots before tripping the elusive pill across the line at 16:02 to register his second point of the contest. Charlton was awarded the assist.

With less than a minute to go Ken Richardson guided Cunningham's long pass into the lower left hand corner behind Beuller and that's the way it ended, Georgetown 9, Elmira 3.

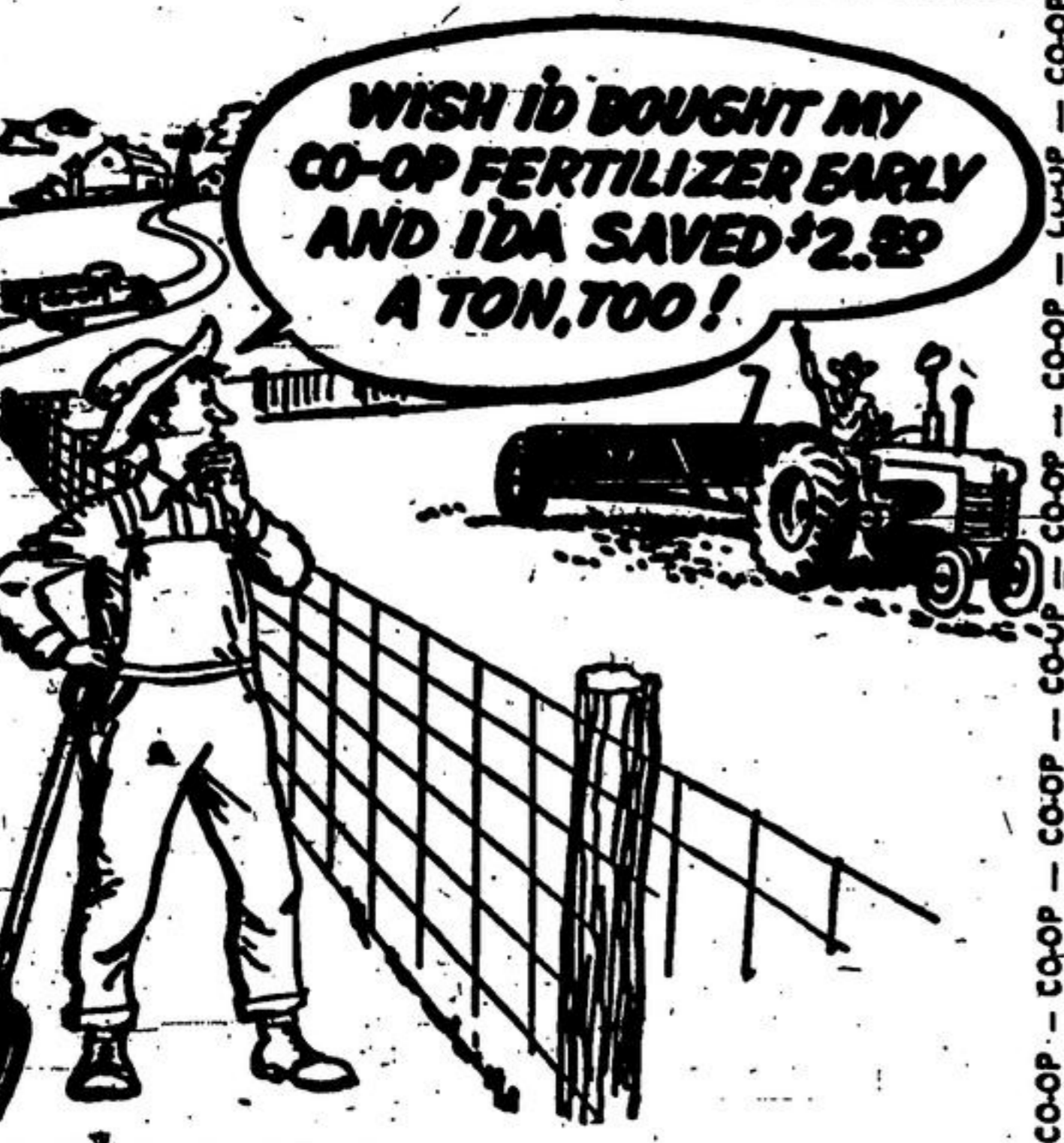

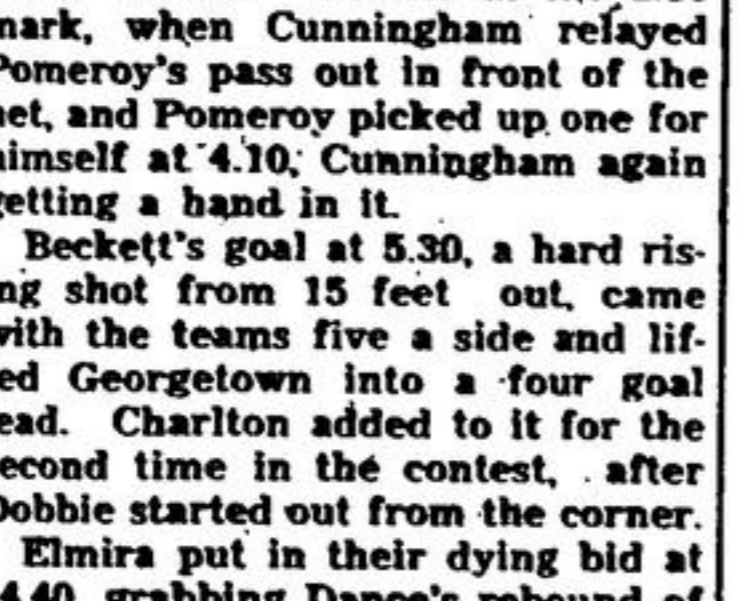
