Horticultural News

Tony Bradshaw
Do you ever wonder where and
how your house plants grow in
their natural state? If you have
a few plants on the window sill
there may be one from Africa
and Asia, perhaps from South
America or the South Sea Islands.
A great many plants come from
Africa. In the house plant line is
a very popular and beautiful
plant, the African Violet. Botani-
cally it is known as Saint Paulia,
many years ago discovered by a
Baron Walter Von Saint Paul.

The African Violet is certainly
a pretty little flowering plant. It
is amazing how long it keeps pro-
ducing bloom and for such a long
period. The fact that it is of tropi-
cal origin, coming from warm
humid regions of East Africa, in-
dicates that it prefers warm moist
conditions in the home. A fairly
good temperature range would be
68 to 70 degrees during the day
and 60 to 62 at night.

Watering is most important and
poor water practices are often
the cause of trouble. It likes a
moist soil but not one that is
soaking all the time. It is a good
practice to check plants every-
day for water. Do not water un-
til the surface of the soil is be-
coming slightly dry. When water-
ing from the top it is well to avoid
getting water on the leaves as it
will spot them. The best way of
watering I think is to stand pots
in a pan of water until it soaks
through the soil to the top, then
take out the pot and let the ex-
cess water drain out. The water
should be at least room tempera-
ture.

Don't forget a little fertilizer,
say about once a month, when
they are growing and blooming
well.

During late fall and winter
your violets will progress well in
a bright south or west window
but later on when the sun gets
stronger they need shade from the
direct sun. So during spring and
summer a bright east or north
window should do them fine.

African violets will make quite
a bit of growth during a year and
it is advisable to repot them once
a year. You will likely find that
you can divide the plants at this
time and so make one or two new
plants. A good mixture for pot-
ting is two parts loam, one part
sand and one part leaf mould or
peat moss. Another easy way to
propagate African violets is by
leaf cuttings. You cut off a leaf
about an inch of the stem at
tached, then take half a pot of
sand and put the stem part of the
leaf down in the sand.

It is a good idea to place a piece
of glass over the pot, this helps
to keep moisture conditions more
uniform. Watering can be done
by placing the pot in a pan of
water. When three or four little
leaves appear you take it out of
sand and plant in flower pot, use
the soil mixture I mentioned pre-
viously.

BEAVER BREAK-IN

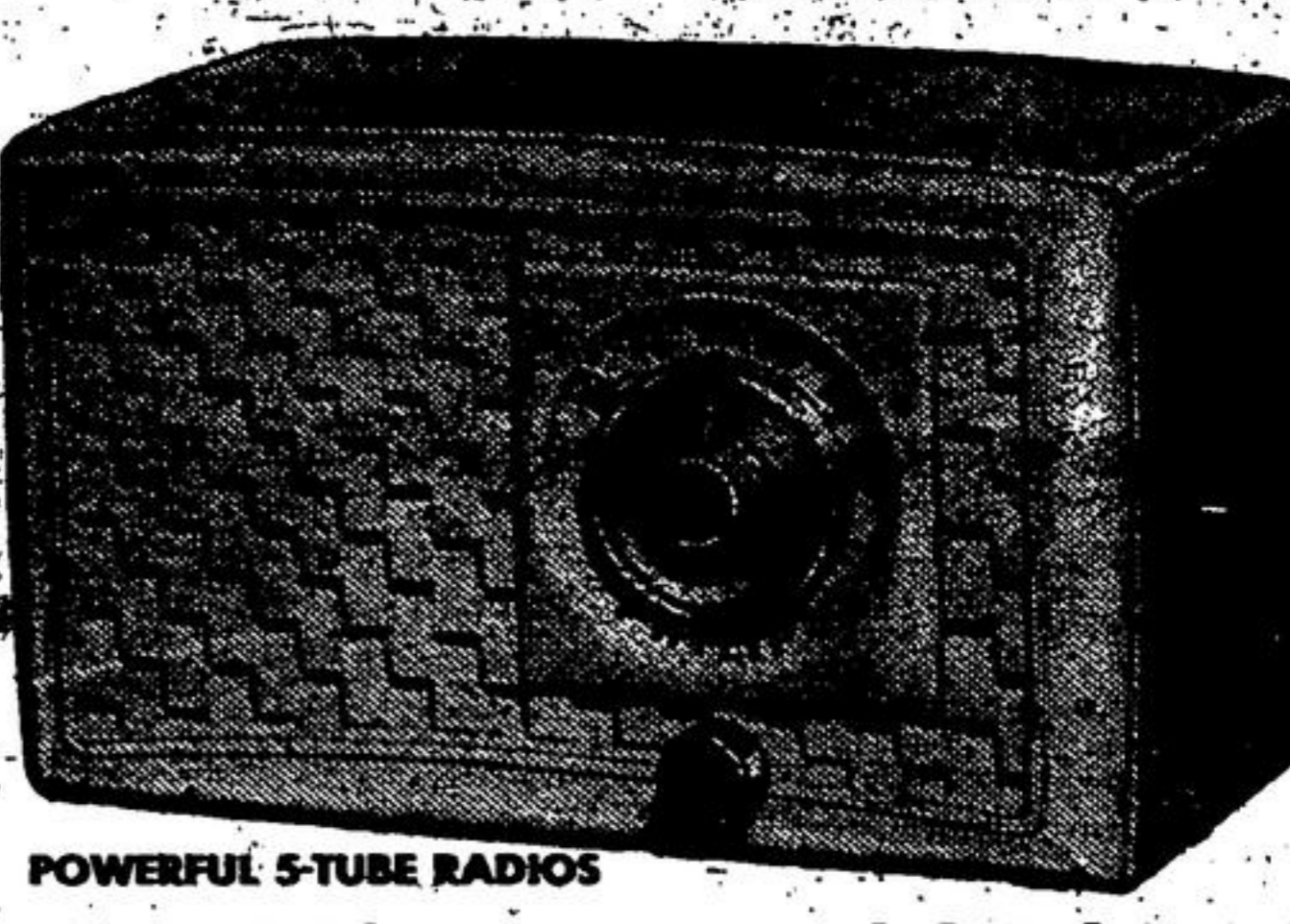
A break-in at Beaver Lumber last
