"Pink String and Sealing Wax" a three-act comedy, murder was brought to town through the efforts of Ron Brighty, 28 Hewson Crescent, a member of the cast with net proceeds donated to the Georgetown Hospital fund.

It was a sparkling production with a capable cast headed by Bill Billings, whose personification of an 1870 father was thoroughly amusing. The stage settings were particularly noteworthy. Period furniture and authentic costuming showed the results of painstaking gathering, and an intricate lighting system was set up for the evening which gave the illusion of a real professional production.

The play was directed by Robert Cairns and produced by Bob Billings. Mrs. Brighty acted as prompter, and Alan Maxwell was stage manager.
