New Position in North'n Manitoba


A Georgetown resident for the past two years, Rudy Meier left town yesterday on a long journey which will take him by train and plane to a new job in northern


On February 5th Acton and Milton will join the Georgetown members at the North Halton Golf and Country Club for the first inter-club meeting of the year.




