**Junior Raiders Overcome Three - Goal Handicap**

**GEORGETOWN 9 - ELMIRA 7** After handing Elmira a fat three goal lead in the early minutes of the first period the Georgetown Junior Raiders rallied to dump the league trailers 9-7 in Elmira Thursday night. The contest, the final meeting of a four game series between the two clubs, in which the J.R.s won all 22 penalties, was punctuated with 22 penalties and changed complexion as often as coach Regé Martin changed lines. The C.P.R. trio, Cunningham, Pomeroy and Richardson, were the hottest line for the Junior Raiders scoring 8 of the 9 centers, Pomeroy backing up Richardson's 4 lallies by posting 2 of his own and assisting on three others. Cunningham, who has dedicated his life to help other people put backs behind nervous netminders, picked up three more assists bringing his total to 15. Beckett and Dobbie were the other marksmen. The three quick Elmira goals were the result of some lax checking on the part of the defence who evidently expected the opposition to lie down and play dead on the strength of Georgetown's 3 and 0 record. Bauman was the first to bulge the Georgetown twine, taking Reger's pass and skating right into beat Lockhurst after just one minute and ten seconds of play. Dalmer, on an end to end rush, bagged number two at 3:18 and 13 seconds later it was Mader from Snider and Dalmer that finally woke Georgetown up to the fact that this wasn't going to be just another one of those bang bang 10-2 affairs. At 8:54 Reger got the gate for kneeling and with Elmira shorthanded Ken Richardson started the J.R.s backs up the ladder, rapping Pomeroy's relayed pass from Cunningham into the short side. The teams were both at full strength when Harrison set Richardson up for his second of the night to make it read Elmira 3, Georgetown 2 at the end of the first period. Pomeroy who has rocketed up to fourth in the point totals set up the equalizer at 2:28 of the middle stanza laying a perfectly timed pass to Richardson, sailing in on his right. The goal, Richardson's 3rd of the game and fourteenth of the season, came with Shantz of Elmira in the penalty box. Just when it looked like George-

lowa-ridden themselves of any Elmira deficit for the rest of the session, Dalmer and Bushert lifted the hosts back into a two goal lead with a couple of quickies, Dalmer from Bauman at the four minute mark and at 4:44 Bushert all by himself. Dobbie's low scored drive from the blue line at 8:38 made it 5-4 and showed the way for carload of tallies that stunned Elmira into submission before the end of the period. Ken Richardson's fourth from Pomeroy and Cunningham midway through the stanza pulled the J.R.s even and at 12:06 Beckett ripped Charlton's pass behind Beuller on a three cornered play touched off by King. Richardson was awarded his fifth point of the night at 14:17 when he assisted Pomeroy in netting the first of a pair scored inside a period of 27 seconds. The other half of his brief outbreak, scored while the Junior Raiders had the odd man, was set up by Dobbie, after he raked in Cunningham's pass. They were five a side when Mader got his second taste of the score sheet, beating Lockhurst with a minute and 48 seconds left in the period, cutting Georgetown's lead to 2. The scoring was even in the final session each team counting once. Elmira came within a single goal of gaining a draw when Bushert converted a pass into their 7th of the night at 3:15. It wasn't until the 10:46 mark, that Beckett got it back, Charlton picking up the lone assist. Elmira did make several serious threats to chop down the lead in the remaining minutes but Lockhurst shut the door on them and did it in brilliant fashion with the help of some great blue line checking by Hyde who turned in one of his best games defensively.
