Cities Service Oil Co. Granted Building Permit

First building report issued by building inspector Harold Campbell this year shows a total of \$21,490 in permit value during the month of January.

Only major item in the report is a \$20,000 permit granted Cities Service Oil Co., which is erecting a service station on the eastern highway approach to town. Other items totalled \$2490, which included alterations to a house by Richard Forster, and service station alterations by Jack Cain.

How town buildign will fare this year is a question, in view of the present credit restrictions. In January, 1956, Georgetown's building boom was at its height and 18 permits were issued for new houses. January, 1955, was more like this year, with a total of \$32,000. However, that year, saw an all-time \$3,825,000 total for the year, with 1956 receding to a total of \$1,660,000.
