Professor Huntley Says Garry Oats are Tops

"I consider Ajax and Beaver oats, and Montcalm barley, to be good varieties. They are still the most commonly grown varieties. However, in 1957, we have the choice of something much better — our figures show an 18 per cent advantage for Garry."

This was the statement of Professor Don Huntley, when addressing the annual meeting of the Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association in Toronto last week. The popular head of the Field Husbandry Department asked this pertinent question: "Should we let seed price determine our choice?" "An average oat crop in Ontario is 45 bus. per acre, 18 per cent of this is 8 bus. Since the highest quality pedigreed seed of Garry oats will cost a farmer \$4.00 or less to seed an acre, while Beaver or Ajax of the lowest quality that could be called seed, will cost at least \$2.50 to seed an acre, it is obvious that it doesn't pay to seed Beaver and Ajax and that seed of these varieties is too expensive at any price."

Stated Dr. Huntley, "They were important in our agriculture over the past ten years" — "their place is in Agricultural history not in seed drill boxes in 1957."

That statement, coming from a man like Dr. Don Huntley, makes one sit up and take notice.

In our limited tests in Halton, and those were pretty well confined to 1956, Garry and Rodney were certainly the tops — away ahead of any other oat variety. However, from our one year's experience we are not prepared to go out on a limb and state which is the better of the two varieties — but Dr. Don Huntley should know. Nevertheless, just to be different perhaps,

According to Dr. Huntley Brant barley over the past 3 years has outyielded Montcalm, which most farmers grow, by 22 per cent.

In his address on "recommended varieties for 1957" Dr. Huntley had this to say on Alfalfa: "For the general farm in alfalfa growing areas, Vernal has established itself as the number one choice. "For production, longevity and general quality, he stated, it is superior in every way to what we call common Northern Alfalfa (Grimm, Ontario, Variegated, etc.)"

Perhaps this is enough on this subject, but don't forget Saturday, March 23, and if you have seed for sale and haven't already done so, get that sample off to the plant production service, at 86 Collier St. in Toronto — and do it this week or you'll be sorry!
