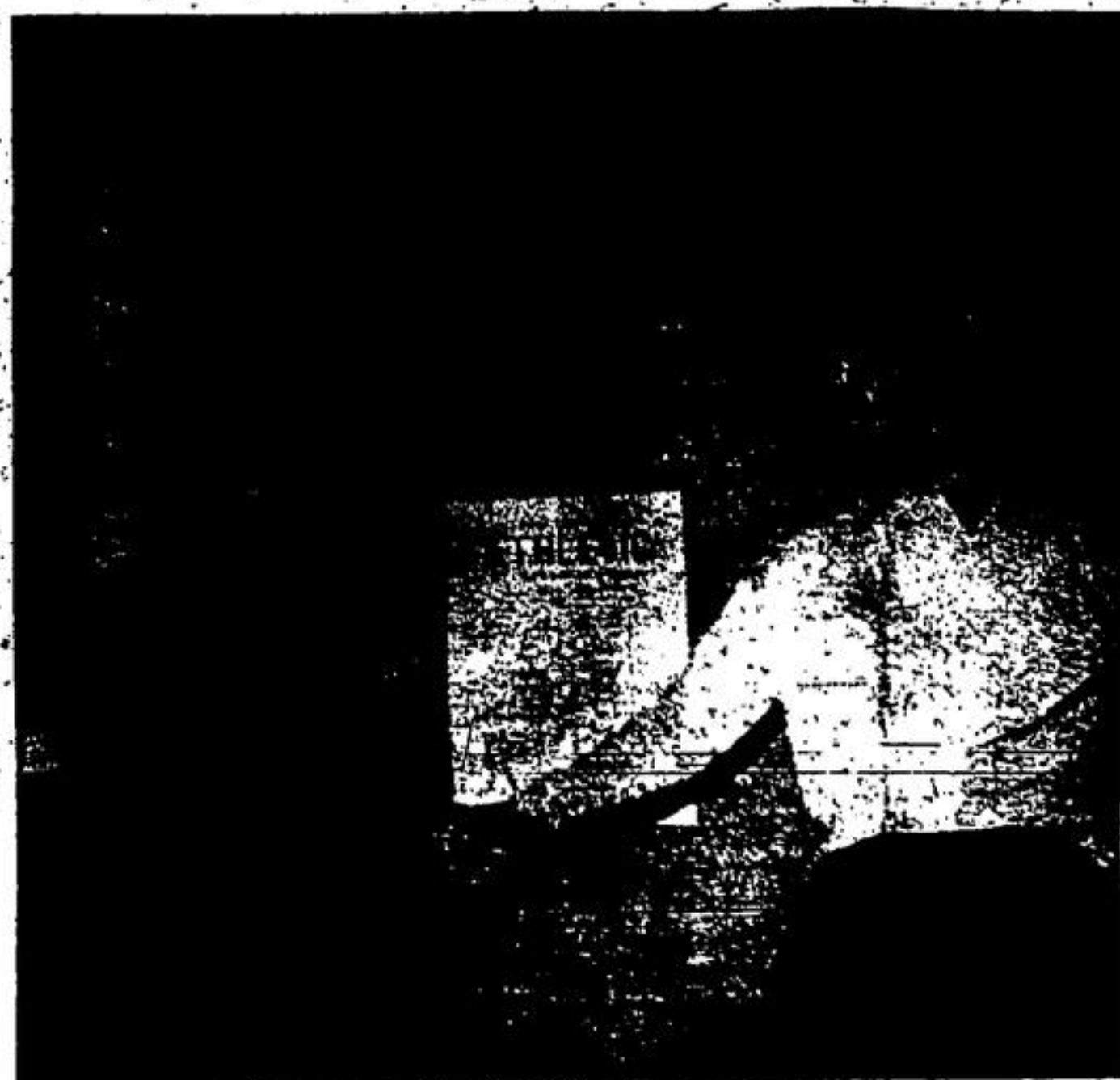

## Juniors Win Last League Game on Their Home Ice

The Junior Raiders have given their won-loss record a considerable face lifting in recent weeks and last Tuesday, February 5th extended their win streak to four in a row by stepping on Acton 6-2. The J.R.'s now have 9 victories against 6 defeats.

While tampering around with some new scoring combinations Joe Dwyer and Rene Martin came up with a solution of Dance, Hart and Dough Richardson, which when shaken up reacts very much like nitro-glycerine. The new line, tho' a little ragged in the 1st period, exploded for 4 of the 6 Georgetown tallies racked up in the final forty. Georgetown had a definite edge in the first stanza and at one time hemmed Acton in their own zone for almost a full 4 minutes but the few direct shots they did get away floated in on the net like weather balloons and were easily guided to one side by Nelson.

With Georgetown playing 5 men to Acton's 6, Doug Richardson ended the scoring famine at 4:05 of the second period, beating Nelson on a solo effort after pouncing on a loose puck inside the Acton line. Dance was off when Hall tied it up a minute and 43 seconds later from a scramble in front of Lockhurst's hut. Baxter and Black were awarded assists on the equalizer. Beckett, Harrison and Charlton combined on a perfectly executed end to end rush to put the J.R.s out in front to stay. Beckett, on the business end of the play, skated right in from the blue line to pick the open corner at the 8:30 mark while the teams were at full strength. This trio is another being used on an experimental basis and should hold the most potential since it unites three of the teams top four snipers.

Dance, the most overdue player of the squad, bagged Georgetown's third at 11:45 a soft backhand shot from 15 feet out that caught Nelson going the wrong way. Doug Richardson picked up his 13th assist of the schedule on the goal by feeding out to Dance from the corner.

At the twelve thirty mark Footitt and Richardson put on a 30 second show for Gillette and were still in the cooler when Arbic

and King were sent off on a roughing charge. Despite the added elbow room neither team was able to put the puck in the mesh.

It was Dance again that put Georgetown into a commanding 3 goal lead on a breakaway early in the final stanza. After killing an Acton threat with a poke check at his own line Dance outraced Hall to the puck at centre ice and let a hot one go from about ten feet out at 3:25 that Nelson didn't make a move on.

Acton's only other counter, came at the 4:47 mark on a backhand by Hall who also was responsible for the first marker and was easily Acton's best threat.

Hart added to the total when he deflected Kings low shot from the blueline over a sprawling Nelson at 10:15 to give Georgetown a 3 goal cushion. Pomeroy got his tenth of the season 8 minutes later. His slider from just inside the Acton line caught the extreme left corner at 18:49 and rapped up the victory which never was in doubt after the second period. It was just a question of how many.

The game was last on home ice for the J.R.s until the playoffs start.
