**Mrs. James Torrie, 91
Former Local Resident**

Death came quietly on Thursday, February 23, after a short illness, to Mrs. James D. Torrie, 91, one of Orangeville's oldest residents. Mrs. Torrie died in the Marquardt Rest Home—where she had lived for the past few years. Despite her advanced years, she had enjoyed mental vigour and excellent health until her final illness.

Mrs. Torrie, who was Janet Anne Young, was born on lot 25, con. 9, Erie Township, and was the daughter of the late Thomas and Janet Young. In March 1898, she married James D. Torrie, who operated a gent's clothing store in Orangeville until his death about thirty years ago.

Following marriage, she and her husband resided in Hillsburgh for a time. In 1900 they moved to Orangeville where Mrs. Torrie has since made her home except for a period of twelve years when she resided with her sisters, the late Misses Minnie and Margaret Young, and her brother, the late Thomas Young, at 48 Main St. S., Georgetown.

Mrs. Torrie was a member of Westminster United Church. In earlier years she had been active in many church organizations and also in the Women's Institute. A woman of high principles coupled with a warm interest in the welfare of others to which was added a keen sense of humor, she had many close friends in the town and district. Although in the long years of her residence there she had lost through death many of these friends and she had, at the same time, seen great changes in the community, she never let her age dim her interest in Orangeville and its people.

Mrs. Torrie leaves three children. They are Arthur of Toronto, Douglas of Orangeville, who assumed his father's business, and Muriel, Mrs. Percy Byers of Huntsville. Also surviving is a brother, William J. Young of Guelph, and eight grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

The funeral service was held at the Thompson Funeral Chapel, Orangeville, on Saturday, Feb. 24, and was conducted by the Rev. Ronald Arkwright. Permanent burial will be made in Huxley's Cemetery, Hillsburgh. The body of Mrs. Torrie was taken to Forest Lawn Mortuary for temporary entombment and the bearers were five grandsons, James, Bruce, Fred, Mac and Allan Torrie, and her son-in-law Percy Byers.

Flowers sent in memory were carried by George Thompson, Earl
