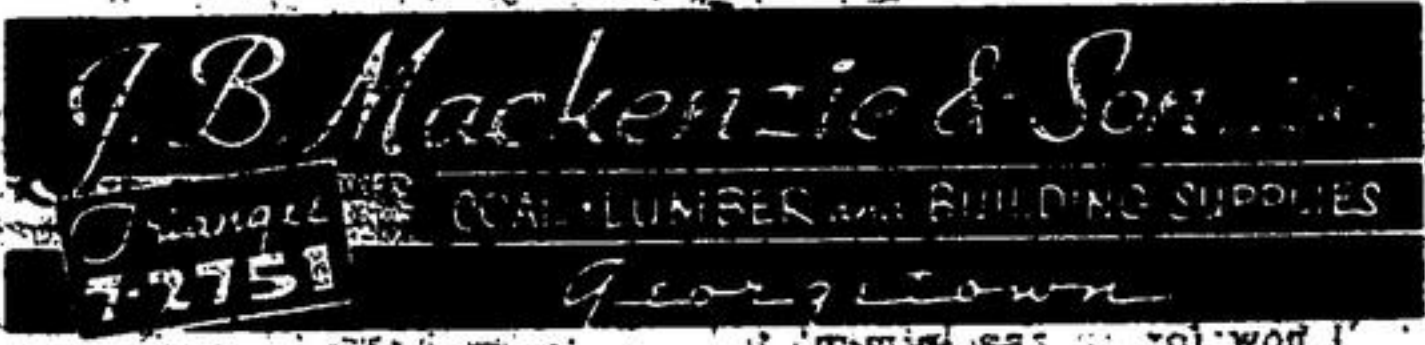

Juniors Take Second Preston Game 8-2

If the best defence is an offence then the Junior Raiders played their best defensive game of the season last Tuesday night in crushing Preston 8-2, at Georgetown Memorial Arena, in the second game of the 4 of 7 series. The penalty shot, a rarity in modern hockey, was exercised when Charlton blocked a rolling puck with his glove inside the Georgetown crease early in the game. Schulz who had been crying for a free shot on every little incident ever since the series started, got his big chance at 15:20 of the first period.

The common procedure is to take a few strides in front of the blue line and let the shot go, but instead of rearing back and rifling one from 25 feet out the Preston player of the year award winner decided to skate right in and digy-doodle. Lockhurst right out of his pads. As expected the Georgetown goalie caught him doodling when he should have been trying a dipsey, and the puck just trickled off to the side. However, Preston did get the first goal and even had the J.R.'s down 2-1 at the start of the third session. With Georgetown's determination and drive in that final stanza, Proud had about as much chance as a peanut in a circus. Cunningham banged in three and Pomeroy and Doug Richardson two apiece as the home club finally cashed in on some of the goals they should have had in the first two periods, especially the opener when they hit the goal post three times. Georgetown jumped into the Preston end right from the face-off and liked it so well that they stayed there for the next 20 minutes. The only time Preston found out what the other end of the ice looked like was when they changed around for the next period.

The Pals did all their scoring in the second, Aucoin capping a quick rush at 2:07 with Fogarty picking up the assist. Lockhurst blocked the big left winger's 1st shot but had no chance on the second one, a back hand from just outside the crease. Despite some great penalty killing by Harrison and Dance Osborne made it 2-0 at 12:14 with Beckett off for interference. Schulz was awarded an assist along with Onorato.

In the 19th minute at 18:24, Dance got one of the few direct shots resulting from the consistent Georgetown pressure and beat Proud cleanly on a picture goal that Hart assisted on. Up to this point the J.R.'s couldn't buy a goal from the Preston netminder who for almost 40 minutes had combined skill, luck and weak Georgetown shooting to look like a good prospect for the first shutout of the series.

The Preston defence flopping around in front of their own net for two periods, made their mistake in the third when they stood up in a rictus. Cunningham tied the game up after just 12 seconds of play, rapping in Pomeroy's relayed pass from Ken Richardson. The teams were five a side when Doug Richardson got the winner on a pass from Hart at the 2:40 mark. Richardson made the defence look more than a little under the weather on the goal romping right in from the red line without so much as a "who goes there" from the opposing rearguards.

Ron Bowman couldn't have helped the Junior Raiders any more on the next marker if he had tied Proud's skate laces together. With Feischman sitting out a hooking penalty, the raggy Preston forward benched for Saturday's game, carried right in front of his own net while still not in control of the puck. The result of this tricky play was posted on the score sheet seconds later — Pomeroy from Richardson and Cunningham, time 5:50.

Cunningham notched his second midway through the period as Preston resistance faded to an occasional poke check. Ken Richardson picked up the assist, his third of an eventual four. Doug Richardson knocked Number 8 behind Proud from a pileup in front of the net at 12:30 and four minutes later at 16:20 Ken Richardson passed to Pomeroy from behind the cage and the CPR line had their 4th of the night. PREDICT HOG PRICE DROP NEXT FALL

The hog price outlook for late 1957 and early 1958 is definitely changing. 1957 will still be profitable for hog producers because of relatively good prices during most of the year and fairly low feed costs. By late fall, there would appear to be plenty of evidence to suggest that hog prices then will be below those of 1956 and any winter price rise will be slight.

This would appear to be the wrong time to expand hog production. As a matter of fact, we would suggest selling any extra bred sows and gilts now while the market is lively.

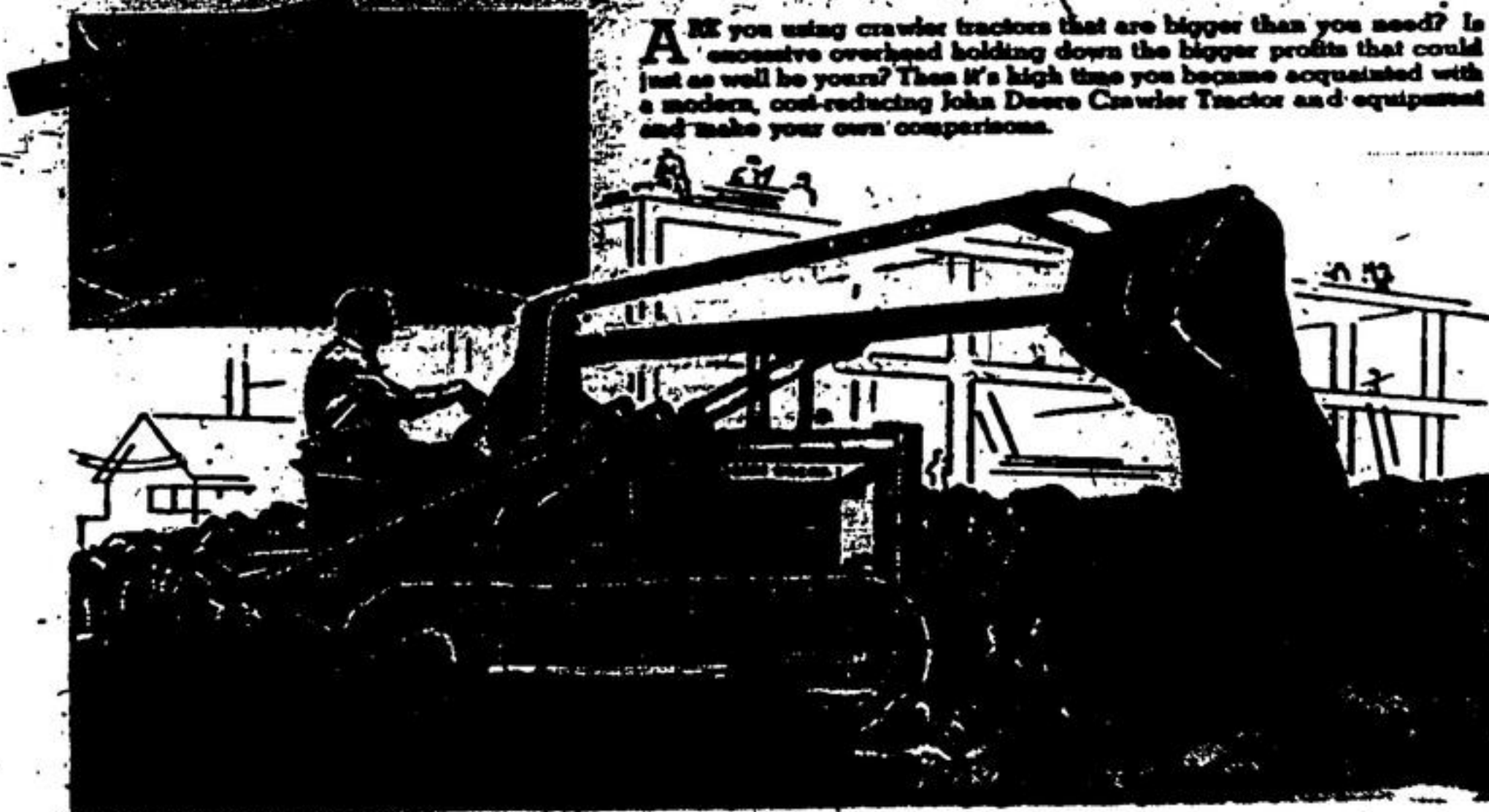

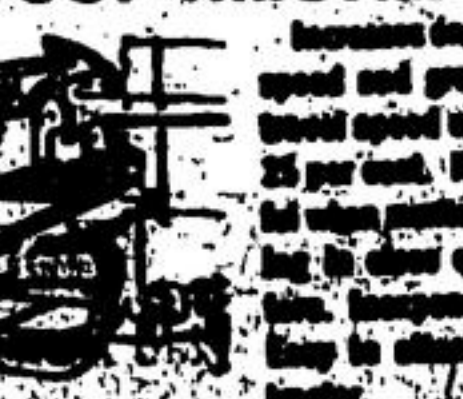
