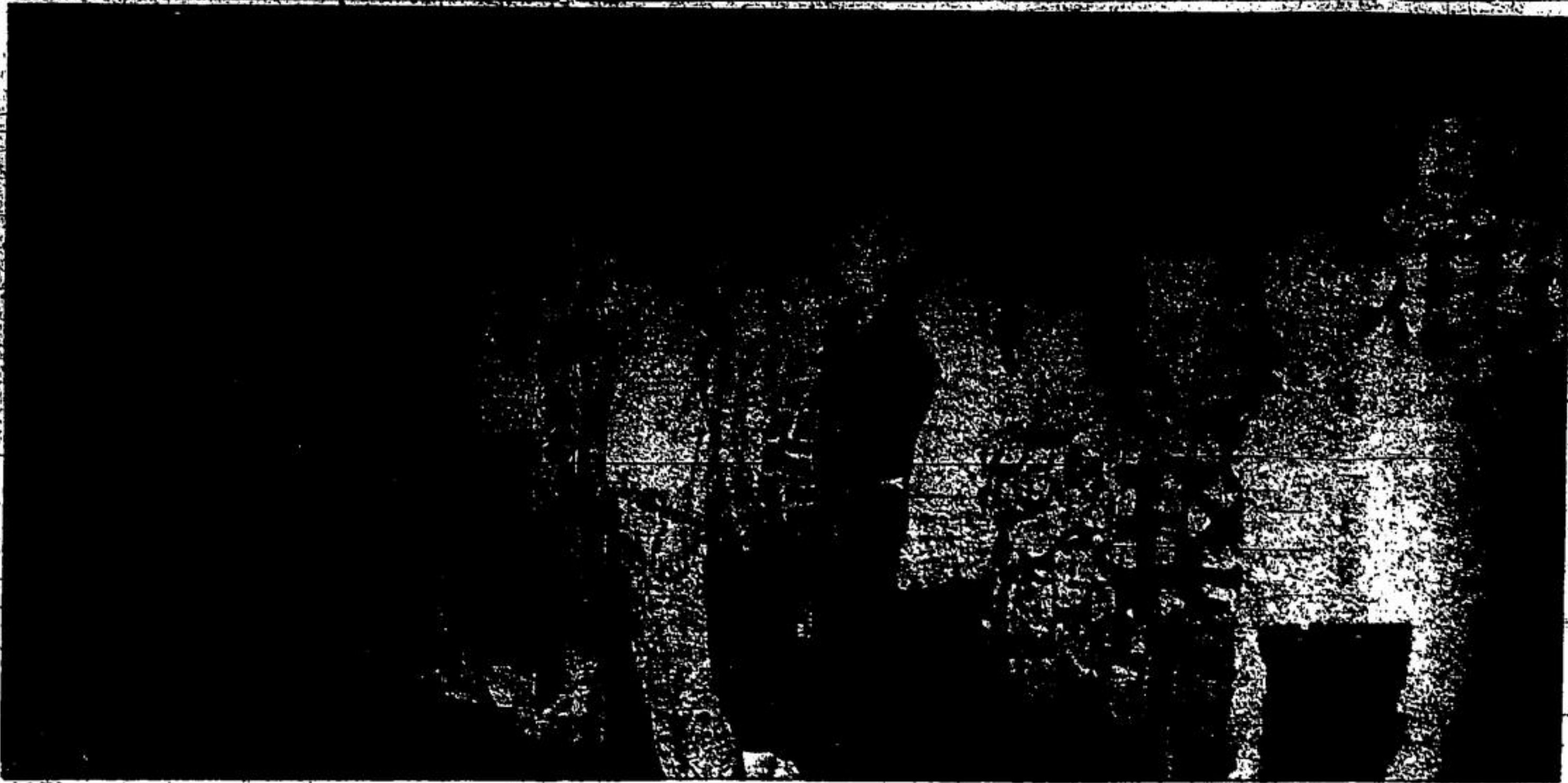

50% JUMP IS PLANNED FOR TOWN WATER RATES

A 50% increase in Georgetown water rates will come into effect on March 1st.

Up to the present, householders have paid a minimum rate of \$1.00 a month, in 6 yearly billings, with extra charges provided for consumption over a minimum amount. The minimum charge will now be \$1.50 monthly and there will also be a 50% increase in extras.

Another change made by council, on recommendation of the water committee, is to abandon a flat rate charge of \$125 which has been made for fire sprinkler systems. Return will be made to a policy of charging for such lines according to the size of the line. In most cases this will mean an increase for firms which maintain such lines too.

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ACCIDENT VICTIM STILL IN HOSPITAL

Mrs. Argyle Campbell, who is a patient in Trenton General Hospital is progressing nicely after the serious accident in which she was involved. Her husband the Rev. Argyle Campbell was killed in the accident which occurred in the village of Wellington when their car was in collision with a half-ton truck.

Mrs. Campbell is the daughter of Mrs. Hugh Black of 28 Church Street. It is expected that she will, in spite of progress, be in hospital a few more weeks.

Memorial Windows for Rev. Griffin Thompson

On February 10th a warm tribute to the memory of the late Reverend Griffin and Mrs. Thompson marked the morning service in the beautiful new church of Holy Trinity, Fennel Avenue, Hamilton, when two stained glass windows were unveiled in the sanctuary of the church.

The dedication was made by the rector, Rev. D. G. Heather, who in his remarks, spoke of the work of the Rev. Mr. Thompson, one of the saints of God, into whose ministry the question of race, color or creed, never entered. Mr. and Mrs. Thompson devoted 32 years of their lives to the parish of Holy Trinity, and the esteem in which their memory is held was evidenced by the large number who attended the service of dedication.

Mr. and Mrs. Thompson resided in Milton for four years following their retirement in 1949. 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APPLICATIONS ACCEPTED for ADOPTION of CHILDREN 4-16 years old

There are many children from 4 to 16 years of age, who are ready to be adopted. Homes are needed for these children now. Because of their age, religion, racial origin or a physical handicap, homes are not easy to find. Security for these children will come from a permanent home. This program does not apply to infants, since the demand for them far exceeds the number of infants available for adoption.

If you are a married couple interested in applying for the adoption of an older or handicapped child, you should be under 45 years of age. You must be in good health and financially capable of caring for the child's future. Your personal character, housemaking ability and capacity to meet the needs of a child requiring special care are important factors in the placement of these children.

Applications for adoption of the following children—and other older or handicapped children—should be directed to the Minister of Public Welfare, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ontario.

Typical of the children seeking permanent adoption homes:

- A pretty little blonde Protestant girl who is 4 years old... She needs a good home and patient, understanding parents... because she is a spastic and must wear a brace on one leg. Fortunately, her chances of someday walking without a brace are promising. But she has to attend a therapy class every week, so she must be in a home near a clinic. This little girl's greatest need now is for love and affection as part of a permanent family.
- Two good-looking brothers who are 8 and 9 years old. They are Roman Catholic, able to speak both English and French. Both boys have brown hair and eyes... with bright personalities to match their healthy physiques. They need a good, permanent home where they can be accepted together as part of the family.
