## Overtime Goal Highlights Preston Junior Victory

A hard, clean goal in the last minute of overtime by Bill Bowman clinched one of the most exciting junior, intermediate, or senior hockey contests ever played in Georgetown arena as Preston put the Junior Raiders on the ropes with their third victory in the 4 out of 7 playoffs series at Georgetown Arena last Tuesday, February 26th.

The theory that the Pals are as good as beaten when down more than one goal was blown sky high by the convincing recovery they made after Georgetown piled up a three goal cushion in the first period. The JRs almost turned the trick themselves when they tied it up in the final minute of the third period and then went into the lead at 5:28 of the overtime with what looked like the clincher. Preston's two tallies in the next four minutes stunned the roaring crowd into a stillness that reflected their disbelief of the sudden change in the grand finale.

The Junior Raiders will now have to take the next three in a row, two of which are on Preston ice. The first stanza was the only one in which Georgetown outscored the visitors. Two fast goals, one by Ken Richardson on a pass, from Cunningham at 2:07 and in the same minute Pomeroy took Cunningham's relay from King at centre ice and swooped right down on Proud who had no chance on the shot.

Preston's only tally of the session came at the 8:06 mark. Schulz let the shot go but it was Ron Bowman that deflected it into the short side to get credit for goal. Schulz and Osborne picking up the assists. The J.R.s had the pressure on for the rest of the period. Preston eagerness in covering up resulted in Georgetown's third goal. Dance stopped a clearing attempt and fed back to Hall who fired a low one through a huddle in front of the net at 11:41.

Hall also had a hand in number 4 for the J.R.s. Rushed at the blue line by three would be checkers Hall slipped to K. Richardson all alone in front of Proud's cage and he made no mistakes.

own defence. Percival was the goal getter from Aucoin. The Georgetown netminder had Eldred's shot at 4:42 lined up all the way. The puck hit Hyde's skate at the last second and trickled over the line before Lockhurst could recover his balance. That's the kind of goal that wins a playoff.

For a while it looked like Georgetown would shut the door there and just pull away for the rest of the game. Charlton bagged the flashiest goal of the struggle 45 seconds later. He of the bushy face stickhandled right from his own side of the red line and was going down under a heavy check when he let the shot go from 10 feet out. Proud just waved at it as it went by.

It was Georgetown 5, Preston 3 at the start of the third but that changed in a hurry. Preston's 4th tally was identical to their first. The Junior Raiders who were already convinced they could pull it out in the resulting overtime session converted 99 per cent of the crowd to that way of thinking when, with Hyde off for flopping on the puck, Ken Richardson tied Proud up in knots with a pinch of stick handling, and then dumped the pill into the unguarded side. If there ever was a time to get up and leave that was it. Nobody budged.

Ron Bowman set up the kill at 6:32 on his tally from Bill Bowman and with 25 seconds remaining it was the same Bill Bowman that squeezed the trigger. When the smoke cleared Georgetown was dead.

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
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
