RAIDERS AND OAKVILLE SPLIT TWO HOME GAMES

After the first three games in their best of seven series, Georgetown Raiders and Oakville Meteors are all even. With the first game ending in a tie, the Raiders won their home game last Wednesday 3-1. They travelled back to Oakville last Friday and were shut out 3-0. The fourth game is in town tonight (Wednesday, March 13th) and the fifth in Oakville on Friday.

Last Wednesday's game at home was a real thriller. In the first period each team notched a goal. Junior Beaumont opened the scoring at 6:10 on assists by Nick Ferri and Tommy Eyles. Oakville came right back to tie it up at 17:35. Bob Bishop getting the goal when both teams had a man in the penalty box. The second period and the first half of the third period were scoreless. At 10:32 Art White let go a long slap shot from centre ice catching Don Hardie, the Oakville goalkeeper by surprise. Before he could move, the puck was past him. This goal proved to be the winner. At 14:54 Blake Inglis tipped in a long shot from brother Jerry to wrap up the game for the locals.

Friday night's game was a different story. The Raiders lacking the drive of the previous game. While they outshot the Oakville team 32 to 13 they had very few clean scoring chances. The few they did have were handled easily by Don Hardie as the Raiders shot the puck right into his pads. Bishop, Milne and Herb Baker were the marksmen for Oakville.

DOTS AND DASHES
The Raiders were handed a severe blow when the OHA declared Tommy Eyles and Merv Duggan ineligible to play in the series. Art White and Jerry Inglis have been by far the best players in the series for the Raiders. Freddie Lawrence has also played standout goal. While Don Hardie for Oakville is a good goal keeper the Raiders have made him look terrific by their erratic shooting.

The forwards have only picked up four goals in three games, with Junior Beaumont scoring half of these. Frank Ptashnik is expected back in the line-up this week-end, and this should help the attack. He was leading scorer for the Raiders before his injury. In the Senior B play off Meaford eliminated Milton four games to one. Elmira is leading Brampton three to two.

NOTRE DAME BOYS HELP FIGHT FIRE

When a grass fire on the Emslie property on Main St. S. threatened to get out of control last Wednesday afternoon, a group of boys from Notre Dame de Beaugard Farm, directed by Miss Therese St. Jean, did a yeoman job of keeping the flames in check until Georgetown firemen arrived.

The fire spread up the hill in both directions, threatening the farm orchard and also approaching the barn on the former W. T. Cromar property. The boys fought the flames with wet bags and shovels, stamping out the fire on the Beaugard property while firemen soon quelled the rest of the blaze.

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Jack Crawford Receives Safe Driving Award

Jack Crawford of the local Brewers' Warehouse, was among a group of company men honoured at a safety award meeting at Rosslyn Grove, Kitchener on Thursday.

He was one of two men receiving 9-year awards representing 30 years of accident-free driving. Mayor Jack Armstrong, a guest at the dinner was asked to make the presentation. Mayors or their representatives performed similar functions for sixteen other men from Guelph, Kitchener, Preston, and Stratford who received awards varying from one to nine years.

Jim Perry, industrial relations coordinator for the company, was guest speaker, and in his talk gave a comprehensive report of the company's safe driving promotion which is recognized as one of the most successful in Canada.

Some 338 drivers, more than 86 per cent of the total number employed by the company are eligible this year for awards of medals and bonus cheques for preventable accident-free year in 1956, he said, and Kitchener district is above average with 91 per cent. He explained how rigid the program operates, by explaining that a small accident on December 31st in one district, where damage amounted to only \$5.43 had been honestly reported and had spoiled what would have been a perfect record for the year.

He quoted insurance brokers as saying that the brewers have one of the outstanding truck fleets in the dominion, and urged drivers to keep up their record. There are more cars every year on the highways, and the more cars there are, the more accidents we should do, although we're not obligated to."

Mr. Perry outlined ten rules of driving which if every motorist observed them, would help avoid many of the accidents which plague the motoring public today.

W. J. Riddell, district manager, introduced Mr. Perry and Philip Schappert, manager of the Kitchener group stores, was dinner chairman. Head table guests included representatives of municipal council, police departments and newspapers, TV and radio, including Mayor Jack Armstrong, Police Chief Roy Haley and Herald editor Walter Biehn from Georgetown.

Albert Colman, 57 Papermill Employee

Albert Edwin Colman, 57, of 18 Edward Street, died suddenly in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, on March 6th. He had been in hospital for over a week after suffering a heart attack.

A Georgetown native, he was the son of the late Ted and Susan Crossman Colman, and his father was Georgetown's town constable many years ago. He was employed in the trucking business with Norman Snyder for some time, and for the past several years at Alliance Paper Mills, Ltd.

Mr. Colman served overseas in World War 2 with the Royal Canadian Artillery. He was a member of First Baptist Church.

Surviving are his wife, Loretta Plant, three children, Mrs. Stan Alkerton (Susan) of Hamilton, Ted or Toronto and Mrs. Norman McDonald (Jean); five grandchildren, and two brothers and two sisters, Jim Colman and Mrs. Jim McMahon (Glenna) of Toronto, William Colman, Hamilton, and Mrs. Herb Ambrose (Maude) of Highland Creek.

Rev. Alfred Barker conducted the funeral service on Saturday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, with interment following in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Pallbearers were Leonard Walker, George Sutherland and four members of the papermill staff, Ernest Ellison, Thomas Eason, Cyril Brandford and Robert Footitt.

THREE CAR COLLISION DURING SNOW STORM
A blustery snow storm late Friday night was blamed for a three-car collision near Georgetown's eastern limits on No. 7 highway which resulted in a wrist injury to one of the drivers and a total of \$25 to the vehicles involved.

Hazardous road conditions and poor visibility prevented Rev. Edgar Gill of Norval from coming to an abrupt stop when he came up behind another vehicle also eastbound on the highway. The driver of the car, Carl Morrison, 64 Main Street was proceeding slowly on the slippery road as a precautionary measure.

A third car travelling behind the Gill car was also unable to stop and skidded into the collision. The driver George Nakatani of the 5th Line, Huttonville, injured his wrist as a result of the impact. He was later taken to Dr. O. M. Brewster's office for treatment.

Damage to the Morrison car was approximately \$25 while the other two vehicles took the brunt of the damage, \$800 to the Gill car and \$500 to Mr. Nakatani's car.

Cst. Harley Lowe of the Georgetown police investigated the accident which occurred almost opposite the new Sykes Tool Corporation factory.

RED CROSS SEEKS \$2255 IN MONDAY NIGHT BLITZ
Objective of the Red Cross financial campaign in the Georgetown district has been set at \$2255.

Twenty-five interested people attended a meeting in the Legion auditorium Thursday to arrange organization for the "Blitz" which will take place shortly and to hear Harley Neff, campaign director for Ontario.

Mr. Neff spoke proudly of the accomplishments of the Junior Red Cross. His theme was that better international relations may exist in future through the work of Junior Red Cross. Realizing that the Red Cross helps anywhere if proof is given that the need is there, it was decided to call the local organization, the Georgetown and District branch, as Georgetown and District.

The Georgetown and District branch of the Red Cross is preparing for a financial "Blitz" campaign on Monday, March 18th when it is planned to visit every home. Quota has been set at \$2255. Contributors who will not be home that night are asked to leave their contribution with a neighbour.

The blitz is part of a dominion-wide campaign. The range and magnitude of Red Cross activities are well known. A few facts about recent activities will be of interest. In Austria, it is providing food, care and clothing for thousands of Hungarian refugees. Within four days of the Hungarian disturbance, a \$40,000 shipment of Canadian Red Cross relief supplies was aboard a plane bound for Europe.

Hungarian immigrants were assisted at Gander airport and all Hungarian immigrant ships and planes were met at Halifax, St. John, Quebec, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

Last year the Red Cross blood transfusion service provided over 124,000 free clinical Rht tests for expectant mothers. In less than 10 years, Canadians have given 1,350,000 bottles of blood to the transfusion service. It is estimated that 97 per cent of Red Cross work is done by volunteers. Nevertheless a sum of six million dollars will be needed this year to meet the many obligations of the Society.

In Monday's blitz, 150 canvassers will be making their rounds. The householders are asked to leave an outside light burning, and to have their contribution ready.
