## Television Coverage Ambulance Presented

Television viewers Sunday evening witnessed a ceremony in which Mayor Jack Armstrong presented the keys to the new municipal ambulance to Chief Ralph Hawes. The scene was telecast on the late news over the Hamilton station.

Actual presentation of the ambulance to the chief of police and council was held at the Municipal office. The mayor expressed his pleasure at the activity of this new organization, believed to be the first in Canada, and thanked volunteers for their services, while Chief Hawes replied for members of the ambulance service, saying it is their pleasure to render this public service to the community. Television arrangements could not be made for that afternoon, and the ceremony was repeated on Sunday for the TV cameras.
