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Juniors Hit Comeback Trail To Win Series With Preston

Junior Raider followers won't forget the comeback story of 1957 for a long time.

Down 3 games to 1 in their championship four out of seven series with Preston, only a couple of weeks ago, the J.R.s took a firmer grip on their sticks and carved out deep gashes in Preston's fast falling confidence with 6-4 and 7-5 wins on Preston and Georgetown ice to pull themselves in position for the crusher last Friday night in Preston Memorial auditorium.

Eight hundred and seventy screaming fans saw it: Georgetown won, and already seven hundred of those fans are trying to forget it. But they've got their work cut out for them.

How do you forget goal scorers like Charlton and Ken Richardson, the persistent checking of Harrison, Beckett and Dance, and bruisers like Thompson, King, and Doble. Or guys like Doug Richardson and Hart who were carrying the puck in the third period like it was glued to their stick, and the way Hyde and Hall were dropping down in front of their hardest shots. Preston had to offer and then getting up and grabbing their own rebounds.

And they'll probably mention numbers 9 and 10, Pomeroy and Cunningham, while giving a recount of the struggle to those unfortunates who chose to go to the policeman's ball or the skating carnival in nearby Galt.

It was Cunningham who banged in the winning goal in the final stanza on a play that never would have materialized if Pomeroy had not worked the pill loose from Preston players trying to cover up in front of their own net.

Without Lockhurst's brilliant reminding all Georgetown's spectators would have been washed down the drain. Time and again he came up with the puck as Preston pulled all the stops in the hectic third session, and when it was all over it was Lockhurst they picked out to boast onto their shoulders, and not because he was the lightest player on the team either.

The comeback theme was even woven into the final game since Preston got the first tally. In come with Georgetown short handed at the 12:25 mark, a long partially screened shot by Bill Bowman on assists from Fleischman and Burn.

The teams were at full strength when Doug Richardson tied it up two minutes later when he rolled in the rebound from Hart's drive from the side and rifled it into the short side from five feet out. Percival found Anselm all alone in front of the Georgetown net and just had to tip the puck out to him from the corner to put the J.R.s into a 2-1 lead that stood up for a period of about 17 seconds.

Charlton allowed Georgetown to skate off on even terms at the end of the first twenty minutes with a quick backhand that Harrison set up to 15:25.

A high lob shot that came at Lockhurst from out of the lights was bobbled and dropped behind the goal line to give Preston their lead back early in the middle session. Onorato got credit for the tally at 3:06 with Hall off.

At 6:59 Georgetown fans breathed a little easier when Charlton rapped the equalizer behind Pomeroy. Beckett was awarded the assist on the goal that climaxed about three minutes of plain old fashioned pressure. The air was so full of tension you could almost spoon it into jars and preserve it for regular league games.

Ken Richardson brought the crowd to their feet when he put the Junior Raiders out in front for the first time in the game with a sizzler that Pomeroy didn't even make a move on until he finished it out of the twine as Preston showed signs of weakening under the strain.

Two successive penalties to the J.R.s, Pomeroy for slashing at 10:08 and Hall for crosschecking at 10:09 enabled Preston to take a deep breath and reorganize. A revitalized attack netted them two goals inside of 18 seconds. Schultz from Burr at 13:52 and Percival unassisted at 14:06. As soon as the teams were back at even strength Georgetown crashed their way back in to the Preston zone. Charlton was mobbed by his team mates when at 14:17 he tied it at five. Thompson and Beckett got the assists.

The third period scoring was limited to Georgetown, and the J.R.s line.

Cunningham's tally at 1:26 was the first time the J.R.s took advantage of the odd man. Fleischman was sitting out a clipping penalty at the time. With the entire session rolled into the remaining 18 minutes and 34 seconds the Preston coach went for broke and took a line comprised of his best strikers, Schulz, Anselm, and Bill Bowman. During the next ten minutes, Lockhurst kicked out pucks in a steady stream.

It wasn't until Ken Richardson extended the lead to two goals that the flood subsided. The back breaker came at 10:50 when Cunningham drew the defence to one side, and then fed a pass to Richardson flying in on his left. Pomeroy tried to throw himself in front of the drive but it was already in the twine.

Preston's hopes died with the clock.
