Why Support Red Cross

As long as there is Red Cross, there is always hope and help for victims of disaster. When trouble or tragedy strikes, the Red Cross is there, ready to give of its skill, material and experience, easing suffering and saving lives. When a hurricane strikes, flood waters rise or fire ravages a community, there is little we as persons can do. By giving, we are there when this great humanitarian organization provides food and clothing, aids the injured, shelters the homeless.

It's an old story to the Canadian Red Cross — the difference between life and death. The Red Cross is appealing for help so that blood will be available always for victims of accident or fire. A million Canadians have received free blood transfusions since the Red Cross service was inaugurated in 1947. Lives have been saved, and more will be saved, through your contribution.

For hospitalized veterans, there is no end to war, and this is only one reason why Red Cross needs your aid. In hospital wards and workshops, instructors teach handicrafts which make the days shorter and life brighter.

The League of Red Cross Societies has assumed complete responsibility for 50,000 Hungarian refugees, 98 per cent of the refugee population in Austria. Food, clothing, drugs are provided by funds from over 40 national Red Cross societies.

The Canadian society has three medical-social welfare teams in Austria now, and a fourth is going. Canadian nurses are providing 16 small Canadian staging camps in the Netherlands where refugees await transportation to Canada.

In Georgetown we have a sick room loan service and a blood donor clinic may be set up. The pennies of Red Cross Juniors swelled the Patsy MacKenzie heart fund to help pay for an operation to close a hole in Patsy's heart. Ask your children or their teacher about Junior Red Cross.

If someone asked "What is the Red Cross?" you could say "Every one!" For you are the Red Cross. It is through your support and your dollars that it is maintained. Apart from bequests, other unsolicited donations and small government support, Red Cross is maintained from its yearly campaign.

Give generously when the canvasser calls March 18th. He is a volunteer too. Ontario objective is \$2,455,077. Georgetown is asking \$2,200.
