Scotsdale Bull is Shorthorn Sale Champ

Grand champion Shorthorn bull at the Ontario Bull Sale was Scotsdale Keepsake, owned by S. G. Bennett, Georgetown. The 14-month youngster sold at \$810 to the Central Ontario Cattle Breeders' Association, Maple, who also purchased the reserve champion Shorthorn at \$1010, consigned by M-H Farms, Milliken.

Another district cattleman, Pat Patterson, Norval, placed second to the reserve grand champion with his junior bull Hereford calf, Locust Lane Elator, who topped the calves selling at \$560.

A large group of district farmers attended the sale. Herefords averaged \$450, Shorthorns \$413 and Angus \$365. A Hereford owned by George Rodentz, Stouffville, drew top sale price of \$1030.

Quality was extremely high at this year's sale, with many animals rejected before they reached the show ring.
