A big fast skating team iced by Welland last Tuesday, March 12th utilized the vastness of their own ice surface and some indifferent play by the Junior Raiders to snatch the first game of a brand new best of 5 series.

The J.R.s big weapon, their uncanny knack of coming on strong in the late stages, was very much in evidence in the final period but this time the clock ran out on them.

Georgetown was lucky to skate off at the end of the first stanza with just a two goal deficit. Their attacks didn't carry the drive, and time and again the wings were dropping back on rushes indicating the 62 mile trip had taken its toll on legs.

There also seemed a tendency to relax since Preston, the number one barrier all season, had been disposed of. This went out the window as the contest progressed when Welland started knocking the lighter crew over like ten pins.

The J.R.s looked a little bit sharper every time they got up.

Lockhurst made several key saves before the first one got by him at the 7:11 mark. Kormos got credit for it from Fox and Varga.

The Combines were playing five men to Georgetown's six when Ivan made it 2-0, rapping in Callaghan's pass at 18:32. The shots on goal fairly well indicated the play in the period. Welland outshot the J.R.s 8 to 3.

Tempers flared on both sides in the wild middle period. Varga set the example for the stanza when he slashed Doug Richardson and then went after him with a high stick. Fists started swinging around the 17 minute mark when things became too crowded in front of the Georgetown net.

Lavey, Fox, Hyde and Lockhurst all got into it. Fox was kicked out of the game for trying to continue the fireworks.

Charlton took full advantage of a penalty shot awarded Georgetown when Bel upset the high scoring centre from behind as he was about to test Worenchuck on a breakaway. Charlton drew the Welland netminder out of his crease walked around him and just slid the pill into the open cage.

Welland answered with two quick tallies in the final minute of the stanza. McGowen set Bell up at the 19:11 mark and Callaghan made it 4-1 13 seconds later on McGowen's relayed pass from Bell.

The Junior Raiders started back up the grade early in the third. After just one minute and 49 seconds Charlton outbanged Worenchuck for Georgetown's second tally. Varga got it back with help from Bell and Kisel at 3:04.

Welland were two men short when Charlton pocketed his 12th in four successive games. An unassisted effort at 8:51. Worenchuk's decision to go after Doug Richardson's drive with his pad cost him Georgetown's fourth tally. The young goaler, who people in the Welland area believe is slated for Jr. 'A' next year tried to kick out the shot which was well above his waist. He attempted to block one of Charlton's tallies with his glove. The one that caught the lower right hand corner.

Despite the big edge Georgetown had in the penalty department, only 6 to Welland's 16, they were outshot by the Combines 38-33. Lockhurst kept the score from going into double figures.
