

**Thomas Morton, 89 Was Acton Barber**

Funeral service was held on Friday, March 15th, at 2:30 o'clock for Thomas Alexander Morton at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, Georgetown. Mr. Morton would have been ninety years of age had he lived till June. Born in Nassagaweya township Mr. Morton lived in the district practically all his life. He was a barber in Acton for thirty-five years until his retirement several years ago. He had been in ill health for some time and died in the Toronto General Hospital on Wednesday, Mar-

**Sunday School Leader Gives Helpful Tips**  
Meeting in the auditorium of St. John's United Church on Mar. 12th, a group of 48 teachers from several Protestant Sunday Schools in town and district heard Mrs. Partridge of Hamilton, an outstanding leader in Baptist primary class work. It was one of a series of instructional meetings promoted by Credit Valley Ministerial Association. Mrs. Partridge showed how she would conduct a class period, beginning with the pre-session. She included fannelgraph stories, worship and an activity phase of a model meeting. She stressed that children should illustrate the bible story being told by drawing scenes. Another teaching method is to compare illustrations of biblical times with similar pictures using today's costume and customs. Helpful hints were given on attendance records, memory work for little folk and pre-session activities. A question period followed her talk. Rev. G. L. Royal, Norval presided at the meeting. Rev. Alfred Barber of First Baptist, Georgetown conducted a devotional and introduced Mrs. Partridge. After the speaker was thanked by Rev. Norman McFarlane of St. John's, lunch was served by members of the St. John's Sunday School staff.
