## Will Instal Radio In Police Cruiser

Council on March 11 voted to instal a 2-way radio in the police cruiser.

Cr. Fred Harrison, police committee chairman, explained that the radio would be of distinct benefit to the police system, avoiding delays which occur at present in locating the cruiser when it is on patrol.

The radio will be on a rental basis from the Bell Telephone Co. at a cost of \$80 a month.

Mayor Armstrong expressed opposition to the expenditure at the present time, saying he prefers to wait for budget figures before making a decision. Several other councillors expressed opinions that the service is necessary and the cost not excessive.

Decision was made to pass no accounts for payment unless they are initiated by the council committee head responsible for the expenditure. Accounts will be passed twice monthly from now on.

A resolution proposed by North York council was endorsed, asking for a provincial-municipal conference to discuss division of responsibilities and revenues to overcome what North York terms "the present desperate plight of municipalities."
