Varied Program For Jehovahs At Brampton

Otto Doezman, a resident of Georgetown, and presiding minister of the local Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, attended with over 50 other delegates from the Georgetown area the three-day week-end assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses held at Brampton, Mar. 1, 2 and 3.

The theme of this assembly was "Tell the Good News." On Friday, night, this theme was highlighted during the ministry school program and the service meeting. The ministry school featured a talk on the presiding ministers' privileges and responsibilities within the congregations. This was followed by two well prepared talks on evolution, how it is unproved-by science and disproved by the Bible. Bible reading followed and counsel was offered on proper delivery and other points. A very interesting service meeting followed which highlighted the theme "Tell the Good News." This service meeting demonstrated that delivering the good news does not end with door to door ministry, but must be followed by return calls at the people's homes. The Watchtower and Awake! magazines were next discussed and the best means of placing these with the public and arousing their interest in the thought-provoking material was investigated.

Saturday was a busy day, full of activity for the delegates at the "Tell the Good News" assembly. 9:00 a.m. featured a short service talk which introduced the magazine day activity. Saturday afternoon witnessed a very serious arrangement in the activities of Jehovah's Witnesses — the baptismal service. Ten ministers symbolized their dedication by total water immersion. This increase in the number of Jehovah's Witnesses is more fully realized by the 30 per cent increase which has taken place within the last six months in the area served by this assembly. These figures substantiate the observation made by one of Canada's national magazines that Jehovah's Witnesses are the fastest growing religious body in Canada today.

Saturday evening, by means of the film "The Happiness of the New World Society" it was demonstrated to the delegates and their friends the wonderful harmony and unity that exists within the new world society. This full color 1 1/2 hour film depicted conditions that man can expect in Jehovah's new world of righteousness under the Kingdom rule of Christ Jesus. There were over 350 witnesses this thrilling film.

On Sunday morning, Jehovah's Witnesses in full strength assembled for service and the last minute advertising of the important public Bible talk "Removing the Barriers Dividing Mankind." This was presented at the Odeon Theatre in Brampton at 3 p.m. Sunday by G. H. Saltmarsh, district supervisor for southern and western Ontario. Mr. Saltmarsh pointed to the national, religious, racial and language barriers dividing mankind and the futile efforts of man through the United Nations and other means to remove them. Religious efforts at interfaith are, in God's sight, "fence straddling" Mr. Saltmarsh said, quoting Revelation 3:15,16. Economic and education attempts have also proved unsuccessful in overcoming barriers to world unity, said the speaker. The reason for disunity was traced to Satan introducing disobedience to God's law in Eden and that to this day, "the whole world is lying in the power of the wicked one," who together with his associate demons continues to mislead mankind. He then pointed to man's efforts as inadequate because only God can crush Satan. The existence of present barriers are a sign of the last days of this divided world. God's new world will follow the universal conflict of Armageddon and bring the oneness of mankind and peaceful conditions. This government will rest upon the shoulders of Jesus Christ, the "Prince of Peace." The basis for peace and unity, he said, will be the worship of the true God, Jehovah.

Today, the New World Society of Jehovah's Witnesses, being united in the recognition of Christ's second presence in kingdom power, seek to know and do God's will and thus live as a nucleus of the "new earth" without national, racial or religious barriers. The key to this oneness is the practice of the two great commandments of the universe — love for God and love for man, which gains oneness with the creator and makes for oneness with each other. All 740 assembled showed their enthusiasm for the speaker's discourse by their rapt attention and prolonged ovation.

Queen's Park Report

Hon. W. A. Goodfellow, Minister of Agriculture said preliminary study has been given university status to the Ontario Agricultural College.

Hon. W. J. Dunlop, Minister of Education, said that the Ontario Department of Education were willing to take over the education of Indian children in Ontario, if the Federal Government were willing to contribute the funds set aside for that purpose.

Hon. W. A. Goodfellow, Minister of Agriculture, in his address paid tribute to Mr. Art Bennett who was assistant agricultural representative for the County of Halton. Mr. Bennett has been called into the head office of the Department of Agriculture to head the Junior Farmer and 4-H Club work.

Labor Minister the Hon. Charles Daley said a select committee should study the provinces labor laws, this is the only fair way to learn the views of both management and labor.

Mr. Albert Wren, Liberal member for Kenora, said that he was behind the Minister of Education that the Indian children of Ontario should get the same education as other children, and that the Federal Government at Ottawa should pay the cost.

Estimates for the Department of Education for March 1957 to March 1958 totalled for ordinary expenditure \$139,906,000.

The Leader of the Government, Hon. Leslie M. Frost, said that the new unconditional grants system is the greatest sweeping change in grants ever attempted by any government.

Hon. George H. Dunbar, Provincial Secretary tabled the annual report of the Workmen's Compensation Board for 1956; the number of people in Ontario that received aid were 666,337.

Premier The Hon. Leslie Frost, said in his remarks, that all Ontario Civil Servants may be working a five day week before long.

Premier Frost also denied a charge by the Leader of the CCF that political patronage was practiced in civil service appointments.

The estimates for the Department of Planning and Development were passed showing that the Province of Ontario paid \$3,900,000 under the Dominion Provincial Partnership agreement for housing development.

First reading was given a bill which would require private land owners to observe the provinces game and fish laws.

Premier Frost said that Ontario is getting niggardly treatment from the Federal Government which had an actual surplus of more than \$336,000,000 because of money hidden away.

Liberal members accused the Premier of fighting the Federal election in the Legislature.

J. A. Maloney, Progressive Conservative Member for South, said in his address that there is living in Ontario one-third of the population of Canada, that there is collected in Ontario one-half the Federal taxes, so out of the Federal Government's surplus of \$336,000,000 Ontario paid half.

The Leader of the Opposition, the Hon. Farquhar Oliver said that the figures that were used by Hon. Frost were just a myth.

Hon. Leslie M. Frost said that the figures he used were the figures tabled in the Federal Government by the Hon. Walter E. Harris, Minister of Finance.

Mr. Oliver apparently did not know that the main figures of the Federal budget are always tabled in the Federal Government the day before the budget is presented.

Progressive Conservative member for Wellington-Dufferin, Mr. John Root, said in his address on toll roads and highways financing, that in his opinion he was not sure whether we were building highways in Ontario as fast as the need was required, with our development in Ontario.
