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Injury-Ridden Juniors Drop Game in Welland

The Junior Raiders lost more than a hockey game in Welland on Friday night.

In the process of dropping their second game to the Welland-Crowland Combines the Georgetown crew suffered costly injuries - at just about every position. Minus Dobbie and Hall in the starting line-up the J.R.s were forced to shift Doug Richardson and Charlton back to the rearward slot when not centering their own lines. This shuttle system took a lot of the steam out of their scoring punch.

Georgetown had a one goal lead at the end for the 1st period but had to settle for a tie at the close of the second. Their usual strong finish just wasn't in the cards as Welland took complete charge and banged in two early tallies which they made stand up for the 5-3 win. Stock-taking in the dressing room wasn't too encouraging. Ken Richardson and King were unable

to move their wrists. Thompson had a charlie horse in both legs. Hyde's knee was swollen up like a balloon. Hart had another cut for his collection this time on his right thigh. Dance renewed a leg injury in the last stanza, and it was still doubtful whether Dobbie bruised ankle would be ready for Saturday action.

There were only two penalties in the first period both to Welland but neither figured in Georgetown's tally. It came at the 14:20 mark on a shot from the right side by D. Richardson that slipped between Worechuck and the post. Dance and Thompson picked up the assists. The shots were even, 5 apiece.

Welland took just a minute and 46 seconds of the second period to even things up. Kisel and McGowen set Iyap up for the goal. Thompson was sent off for crosschecking Bourque at 2:49 and as a result Georgetown was short-handed when they regained the lead 39 seconds later. Charlton was the marksman picking the upper right hand corner at 3:38 after Harrison led him pass from behind the net.

Hyde was off when Reeves tapped in his first of a pair that lifted the Combines back into a one goal lead. McGowen and Callaghan got the assists on the drive from 20 feet out that found a space on Lockhurst's stick side. He struck again at 7:14 from a scramble. Bourque assisted.

The teams were at full strength when the J.R.s pulled even on one of their last shows of power in the contest. Dance flipped to Hyde at the blue line who let a low shot go that Worechuck misjudged. Welland missed numerous chances to bag the winner in the remaining minutes of the middle session. Callaghan muffed the best opportunity on a breakaway around the 15 minute mark. With just Lockhurst to beat he stickhandled all the way in the blue line and then blasted it right into his pads. Turinski following up, hit the goal post. Minutes later Ivan found himself in possession in front of the Georgetown net and nobody to outguess since Lockhurst had been bodied to the ice in the midst of a scramble. His drive from about 10 feet out drifted over the top bar.

Welland carried the play into the Georgetown zone right from the face off at the start of the last period where only their own weird shooting kept them from blinking the red light. A hard shot by Ivan hit Lockhurst and dropped at his feet. Lockhurst went to his hands and knees and made about three grabs at the elusive pill before Kormos romped in from side and tapped in the winner at 3:13.

Fox started Milencoff away for the clincher. The rangy centre went almost the entire length of the ice deked the defence and then triggered his shot from about 15 feet out. It dented the mesh at 5:54. The J.R.s were unable to generate a serious attack during the remaining 14 minutes and at no time did the 2 goal margin seem threatened. 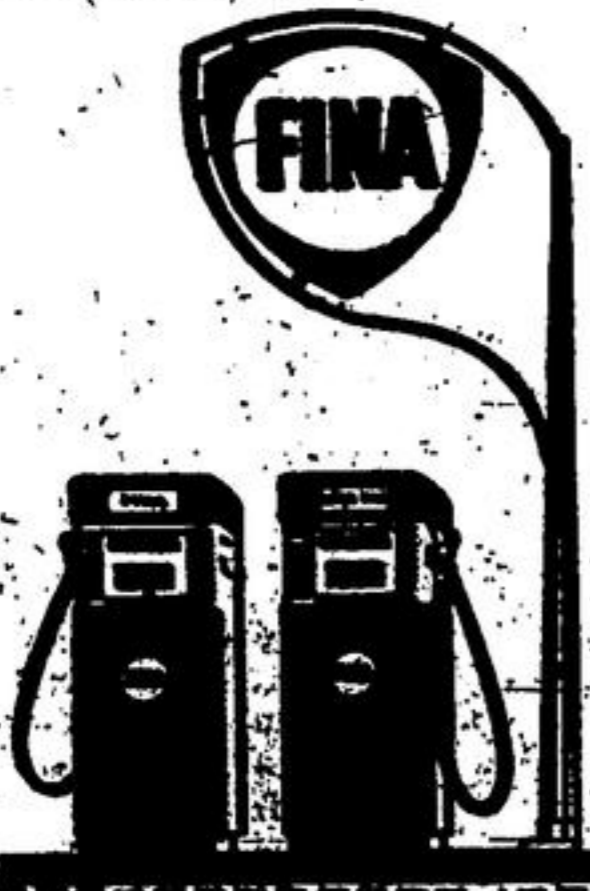

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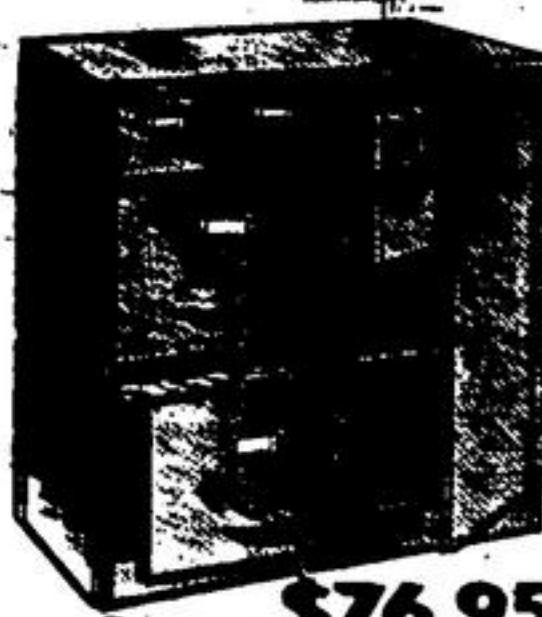
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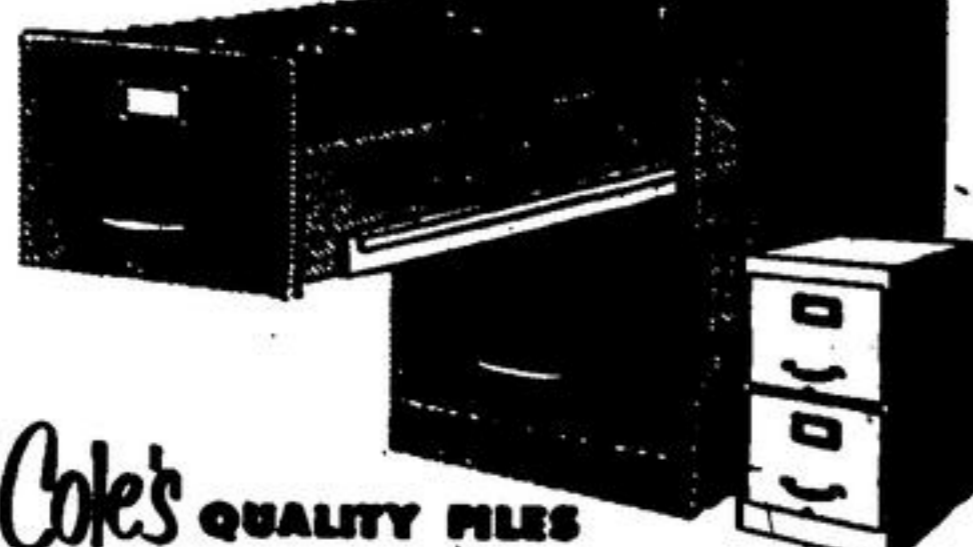
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
