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FARM NEWS

4-H Club Leaders Make Plans For 1957 Program

Halton's 4-H Club programme for 1957 started off with a play party and social evening at the Fairview School, Lowville, on March 20th. Chairman A. T. Woodley together with Messrs. A. R. Coulter and George Pelletterio, went all out to make this year's event an even greater success than that of a year ago. It provided an opportunity for club leaders to get to know the club members, and further, it was an occasion when parents, and their young people can play together — something that is all too rare in our present day economy.

Outstanding Year

1956 was in many respects the most outstanding year in the history of 4-H Club work in Halton County. The 4-H Homemakers already have their program under way—the 4-H Agricultural Club members will hold the organization meeting for all clubs, with the exception of the Tractor and Grain Clubs being organized—in the Acton district, on Friday evening, April 5th, in the Court House at Milton. Chairman A. T. Woodley points out that attendance at the organization meeting is important for two reasons—first, in order that the club members receive full details concerning the project or projects in which they plan to enroll, including record books, etc.; secondly, attendance at this meeting counts when the awards are being worked out next fall.

Clubs Planned

This year the usual three Calf Clubs are being offered, namely: the 4-H Holstein Calf Club; the 4-H Beef and Dual Purpose Calf Club; and the 4-H Jersey-Guernsey Calf Club. In addition, there will be a 4-H Swine Club; a 4-H Tractor Maintenance Club; a 4-H Potato Club, and three 4-H Grain Clubs.

4-H Grain Clubs

The Acton Agricultural Society is again sponsoring a Second Year project with the members of the club organized in that district in 1956.

Present plans are to combine the last year's Grain Club sponsored by the Esqueving Agricultural Society, and that sponsored by the

4-H Swine Club

The Halton Agricultural Society is again, with the co-operation of the Halton Hog Producers' Assn., sponsoring a 4-H Swine Club. In this project the members will commence with either a pair of pure bred gilts, or a pure bred gilt and a barrow. The gilt will be raised for breeding purposes, and the barrow sold on reaching market weight.

More details will be available at the organization meeting.

4-H Tractor Club

The 4-H Tractor Maintenance Club this year is slated for the Acton area, and is being sponsored by the Acton Junior Farmers. It is open to any boy between the ages of 14 and 20 years. For further information, we would suggest contacting Mac Sprowl, who will likely be one of the club leaders.

Special Features

The 4-H Club Leaders enthusiastically agreed that the annual 4-H bus trip and the annual 4-H awards night were very worthwhile, and will be a part of the 4-H Club program again this year. In addition, a number of trophies are up for competition. Furthermore, the Kingsway Kiwanis Club has intimated their continued interest and support by offering special awards; and all new members will receive a 4-H pin or crest when completing a project.

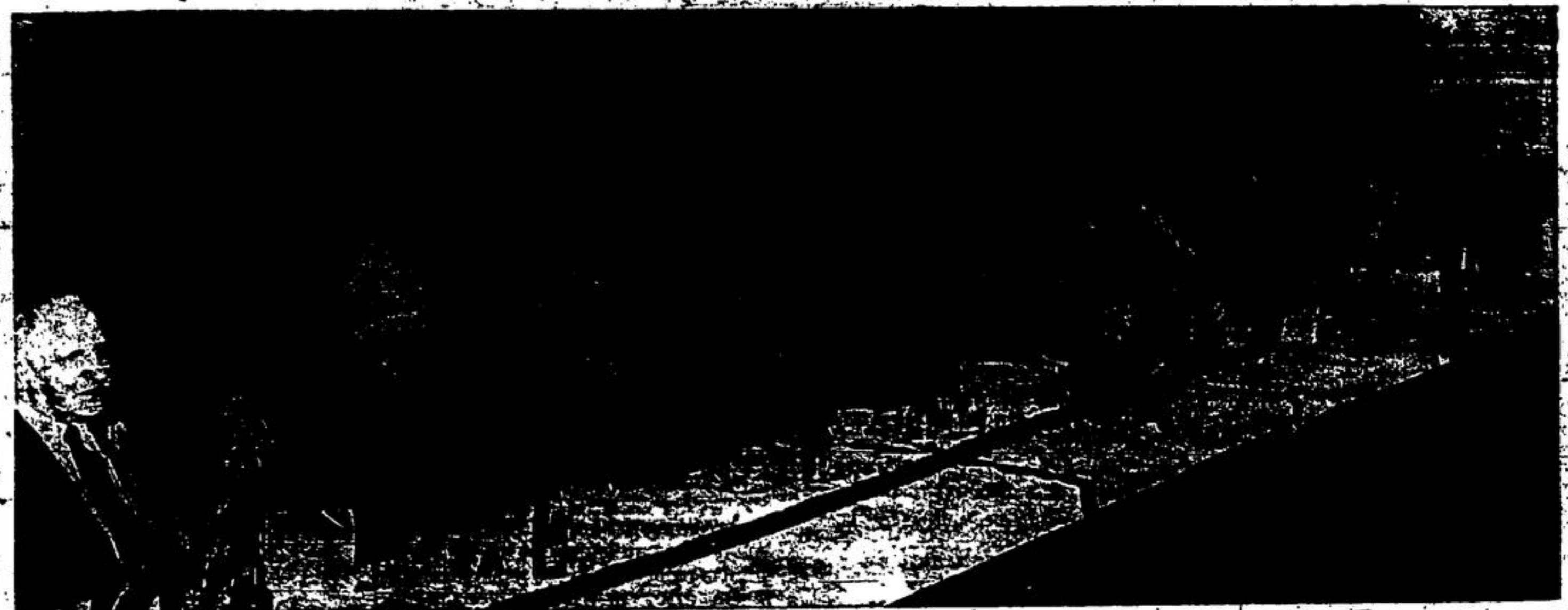
Dedicate Cub Flag At Church Service

THIEVES ENTER TWO HOMES, STEAL CASH

A truck owned by the Georgetown Transportation company was involved in a collision with a late model car March 23rd when the driver of the second vehicle attempted to pass as the truck was about to make a left turn opposite Queen Street.

The driver of the truck, Ron Ritchie, 9 Emery Street, had just pulled toward the centre of the road, slowing up to make the left turn to go north on Queen when the following vehicle, driven by Sidney Martill, 69 of Gerard St., Kitchener, proceeded to pass.

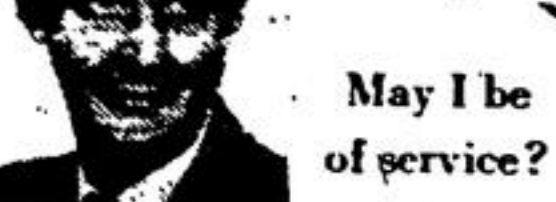
FREEMAN KERSEY OFF ON CONTINENTAL TOUR

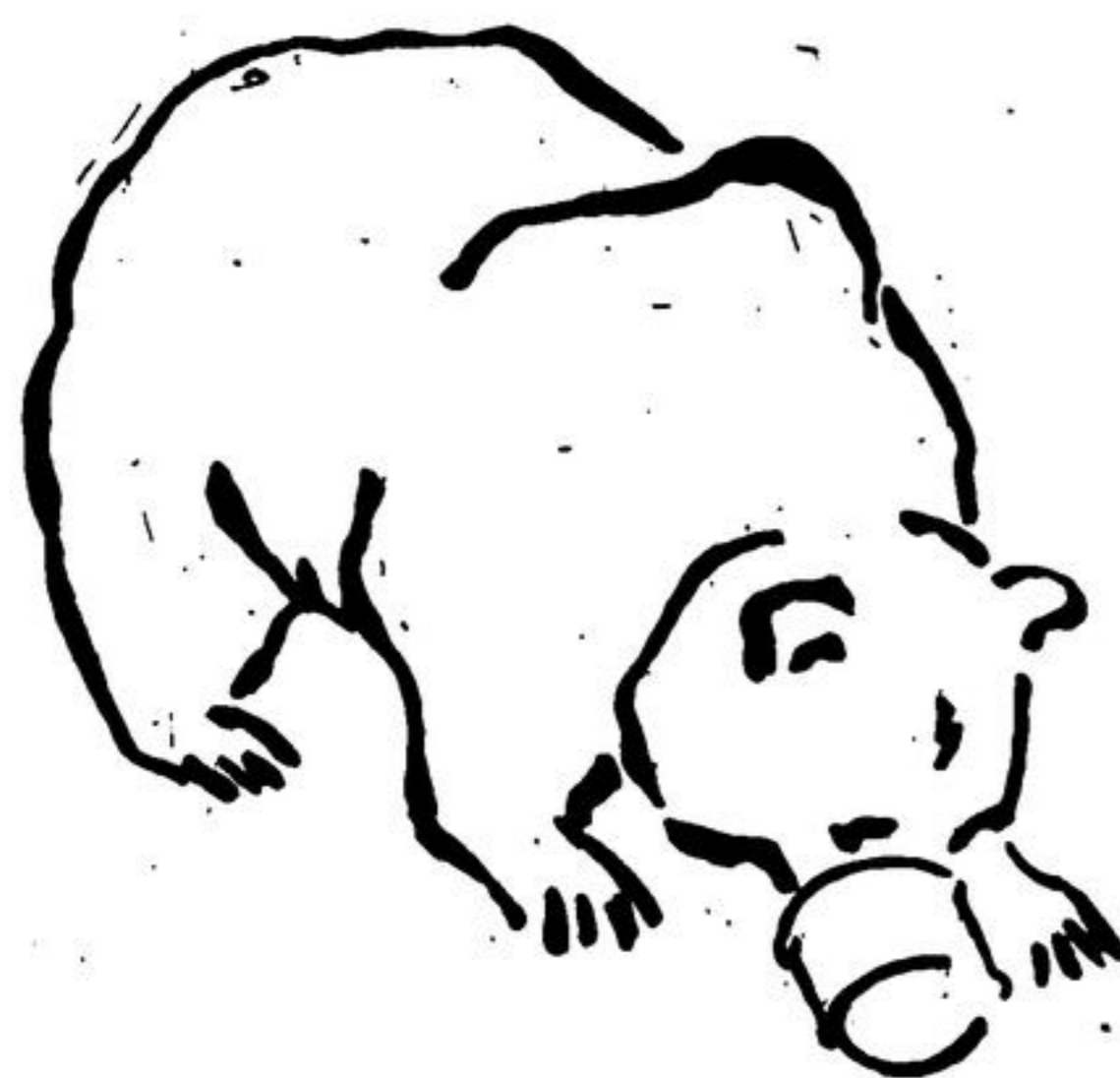
