"Kick store hours around too long and you'll end by being dictated to by the government or the public," was a warning sounded to merchants by Ron Darbyshire when he spoke at a "CHRYSLER '67" Commerce dinner at North Halton Golf Club last Tuesday.

Mr. Darbyshire, former Argos football player is field service manager for the Canadian Retail Federation. He explained that this organization was formed in 1941 by a group of large department stores to protect themselves against what was happening in Ottawa with the Wartime Prices Board.

Since then it has greatly expanded and has many small retailers in its membership as well as commerce chambers and boards of trade.

Every businessman should belong to a trade association, he said, for a man owes something to the profession to which he belongs.

In return, he cited several things a businessman obtains from membership. Research, market trends and technical developments are made available by cooperative ac-

tion, he said. Government is made aware of an industry's problems. Group meetings offer opportunity for exchange of ideas.

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Arts, Crafts Members Learn Flower Arranging

Mrs. Leonard Bell, Charles St., was hostess at her home to the regular monthly meeting of the Arts and Crafts last Thursday. Mrs. Richard Shearly of Byron Street, was welcomed as a new member. Mrs. William Reynolds, was appointed night school representative on behalf of the Arts and Crafts.

Miss Adelaide Miller introduced the guest speaker, Mrs. E. F. Flegg of Etobicoke. Mrs. Flegg is a commercial artist and has her own small greenhouse at her home and has found expression in the art of arranging flowers. She stated that flower arranging should be fun, one should know and follow some definite rules. She suggested the Conway books as books of instruction. Rules are often used as guides for beginners and when one has skill enough variations are highly desirable.

Mrs. Flegg demonstrated the "arranging mechanics" with the use of correct materials. She showed an arrangement of flowers and leaves, using weeds, dried flowers and corn leaves which was very effective, to make it even more so she placed this on a piece of plywood and added a carved wood bullfighter ornament for the focal point. She also gave quick methods for the drying of flowers to retain their natural colorings.

An all white arrangement consisting of three white carnations, three white snapdragons and green yew, arranged in the triangular design was very much admired. An arrangement of daffodils and pussy willows in a taupe coloured vase set on a bamboo mat, against a plain background was an effective spring touch. A suggested arrangement for small tables was a tiny grouping of narcissus and pussy willow and yew.

For a hall table arrangement, in a small flat dish, daffodils and pussy willows with begonia leaves was arranged, set on a flat field stone with two little elves for figurines. Her suggested arrangement for a dining table was red cyclamen, pink begonia flowers and philodendron in a low, flat dish. A crescent arrangement of rosy mums and pink tulips and juniper was suitable for a buffet.

Mrs. Flegg gave the members many tips on the arranging, cutting and conditioning of flowers to make them last longer. She compared the art of arranging the flowers to the painting of a picture and suggested the use of ornaments as a means of bringing a design to life.

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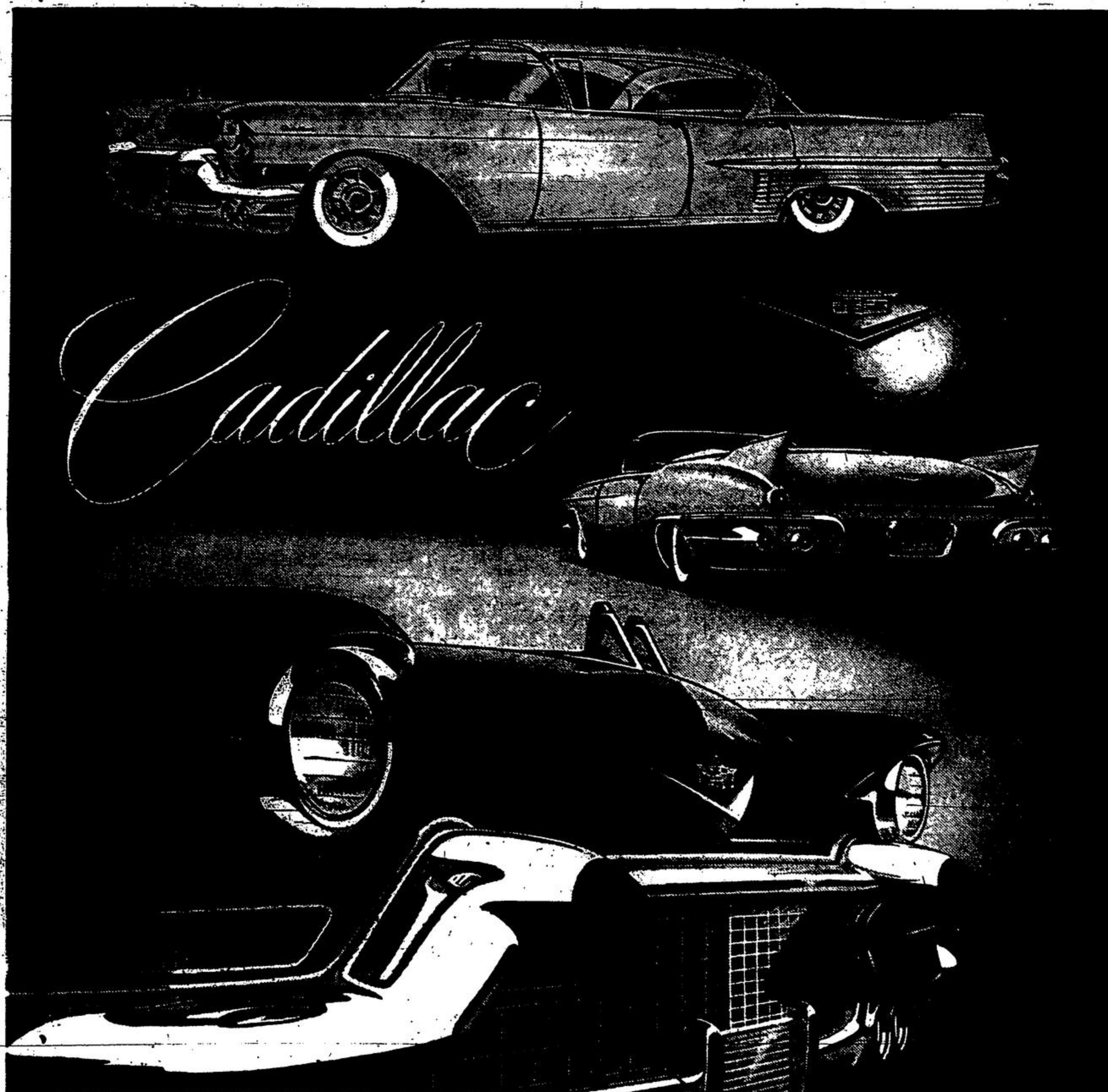
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
