Grain Corn Has Edge In Spring Cereals

In a recent release by the Farm Economics Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture entitled "Average Production Costs and Returns for Several Omario Crops," the figures indicate a wide margin in favour of Grain Corn over spring cereal grains. The crop value per acre for spring grain is given as \$30 and \$70 for grain corn. Labor requirements are given as 8 and 10 hours respectively and the production costs given are \$30 per acre in the case of spring grain, and \$41 for grain corn. The returns per hour of labour are nearly five times greater in the case of grain corn.

These figures are based on an average yield of 41 bus, for spring grain, and 60 bus per acre for grain corn. One can also make a good case for grain corn on the basis of digestive nutrients. Certainly on our more loamy soils in Halton where fall plowing is not a "must." - such farm operators would be well advised to give the grain corn a try. Three to five acrès might be sufficient for 'a start. It is a matter which requires a little study from the standpoint of soil type, fertilization, variety, labour, equipment, and storage.
