

Queen's Park Report

At this session of the Ontario Legislature there were passed 177 bills, more bills than were ever passed in one session of the Ontario Legislature, three of these bills were new, which established three new Government Commissions.

Bill 185 is the bill that the citizens of Ontario have been looking for, for a long time, giving the Government the power to establish the Hospital Services Commission, but it will not be possible for this Act to come into force before 1952.

Bill 188 is an Act giving the Government the power to establish the Ontario Department of Transport.

Bill 194 is an Act giving the Government the power to establish the Ontario Water Resources Commission.

Mr. Oliver, Leader of Opposition moved a resolution in relation to the Ontario Municipal Act and called for a vote to be taken, the resolution was defeated 65 to 13, the C.C.F. group voting with the Government.

Mr. Harry Nixon, Liberal for Brant County celebrated his birthday on April 1st. Mr. Nixon has sat in the Ontario Legislature continuously since 1919, longer than any member in any political party, and I would like again to take this opportunity to pay my congratulations to Mr. Nixon.

Mr. H. E. Becket, Progressive Conservative for York East, moved a motion in relation to remarks made in the assembly by Mr. McDonald, Leader of the C.C.F. group in relation to a private bill presented by the Township of Scarborough be referred to the standing committee on privileges and elections. This is the first sitting of this committee on a question of this kind since 1921.

Mr. West, Liberal Labor for Kenora moved a resolution that a Fur Marketing Board be set up in Ontario. This was defeated on the grounds that the Department of Lands and Forests has established District Fur Auction Markets in Ontario.

Mr. Villeneuve, Progressive Conservative for Glengarry, said in his address that the estimates for the Departments of Education and Highways for this year are double the amount of the entire estimates of the Ontario Government when he came into the Legislature in 1948. The estimates for 1949 were \$150,314,000. for Education and Highways. This year these estimates amount to \$100,000,000.

A motion by the Premier the Honourable Leslie Frost to adjourn the debate on a motion moved by Mr. White, Liberal for Erie, was opposed by the Opposition who called for a vote; the vote being 72 to 14 in favour of the Premier's motion.

A resolution presented by Mr. Junis, Liberal Oxford, that the Ontario Agriculture College, the Ontario Veterinary College, and the Macdonald Institute, should be removed from the Department of Agriculture, and be operated by a Board of Governors, was opposed by the Government on the grounds of finance, and that it was constituted as a farmers' school to assist the farmers and their boys and girls to get an agricultural education. The resolution was defeated by a large majority.

It was announced in the Legislature on April 3rd that it was the fifty-sixth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Lewis, who was Clerk of the Assembly for many years.

Mr. Lewis is now retired and the office is now filled by his son, Mr. Roderick Lewis.

Mr. Oliver, Leader of the Opposition, in his closing remarks said that many questions of great importance had been debated during this session, and in his opinion the bill on universal hospital insurance was one of the greatest. Mr. Oliver also said that he considered that this session of the Legislature had done a good job for the citizens of Ontario.

Honourable Leslie Frost, Premier and Leader of the Government said in his closing remarks that in his opinion that the Legislature dealing with 75 bills of the 77 presented was an accomplishment never before accomplished in the Legislature.

The Lieutenant Governor, the Honourable Louis E. Brehaupt, on Wednesday, April 3rd, prorogued the Assembly in due fashion with a lovely assembly of ladies in the galleries, so came to an end the longest session in the history of the Government of Ontario. Stanley L. Hall, M.P.P.

FARM NEWS
Grain Corn Has Edge In Spring Cereals

In a recent release by the Farm Economics Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture entitled "Average Production Costs and Returns for Several Ontario Crops," the figures indicate a wide margin in favour of grain corn over spring cereal grains. The crop value per acre for spring grain is given as \$30 and \$70 for grain corn. Labor requirements are given as 8 and 10 hours respectively and the production costs given are \$30 per acre in the case of spring grain, and \$41 for grain corn. The returns per hour of labour are nearly five times greater in the case of grain corn.

These figures are based on an average yield of 41 bushels for spring grain, and 60 bushels per acre for grain corn. One can also make a good case for grain corn on the basis of digestive nutrients. Certainly on our more loamy soils in Halton where fall plowing is not a "must," such farm operators would be well advised to give the grain corn a try. Three to five acres might be sufficient for a start. It is a matter which requires a little study from the standpoint of soil type, fertilization, variety, labour, equipment, and storage.
