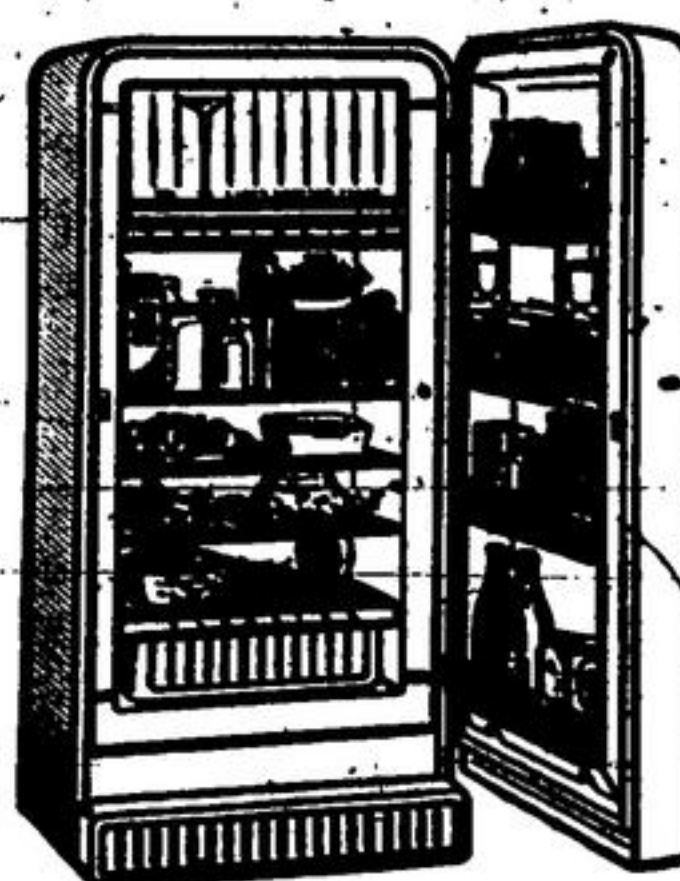

## United Mission Members Have Conference Here

St. John's United Church was host last Wednesday for the 28th annual meeting of Halton Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society. The president, Mrs. Arthur Harris, opened the day's session with a welcome to delegates. A highlight of the day's news was that Halton has exceeded its allocation by \$2293, which is to be sent to help build a girls' high school in Korea.

Following the worship service by Ashgrove Auxiliary, a panel discussion on missionary education was presented by Clarkson Federation. During the morning session, Mrs. Charles Junkin, president of the Georgetown auxiliary welcomed the guests on behalf of her branch and expressed pleasure in having the Presbyterian WMS meet in Georgetown.

Following noon luncheon, Mrs. J. McKillop, president of the dominion board, Mrs. Ross Patterson Hamilton conference branch, Mrs. Mrs. W. Fleuty, president of Halton Presbytery W.A., and Rev. Morgan McFarlane, minister of St. John's and chairman of Halton Presbytery brought greetings. Mrs. Dorland Haight, Wesley Auxiliary, opened the afternoon session with a devotional period.

Mrs. McKillop, as guest speaker, gave several answers to the one million, two hundred thousand dollar questions on WMS work. Mrs. Arthur Harris spoke of the need for overseas relief. She said if ladies are fired enough with the need, cooperation will follow. An impressive memorial service was conducted by the Action branch - Mrs. King Applewood Acres, sang two solos.

An Easter worship service by Georgetown CGIT added greatly to the evening program. Mrs. R. Patterson challenged delegates to follow Christ's command to a woman on resurrection morning: "Go tell my disciples I live". Lowville Evening Auxiliary won the reading award with a record of over eleven books per member.

## MP Speaks About Northland Railway

In a recent radio broadcast, Stan Hall, M.P.P. for Halton, extolled the part the Ontario Northland Railway has played in the development of Northern Ontario, and urged Canadians to "See Canada First" by visiting a part of the province where scenery, hunting, fishing and beauty are unexcelled. Since its inception in 1962, the provincial government has invested some \$30,207,000 in the railway, which has returned almost seventeen and a half million to the provincial treasury, he said. Mr. Hall said he has travelled every mile of the railway, and finds its equipment and personnel cannot be equalled anywhere on the continent. Motive power will soon be all dieselized, and 48 diesels are operating at present, all equipped with radio telephones.

The railway transmits the sound portion of CBC television programs to a new TV station at Timmins. A rail car, used for track inspection, is also available as an ambulance for isolated communi-

ties in an emergency. Total assets of the railway at the end of 1956 were \$74,533,404.
