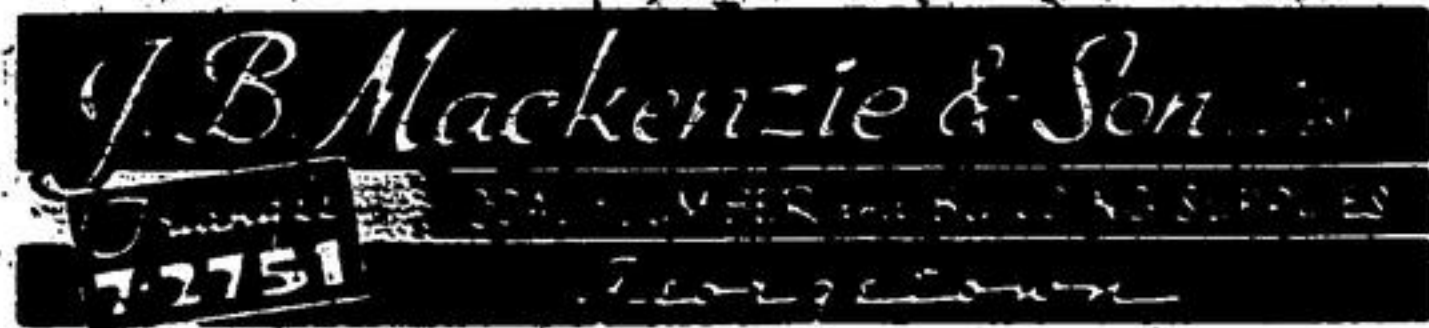

FARM NEWS

Which Bulk Tank?

"Should I install a bulk tank?" "If so, which is the best type of tank to install?" These are some of the questions which are bothering a lot of milk shippers, judging by the discussion at a recent meeting of the directors of the Halton District Milk Producers held at Stewarttown on Monday evening of last week. Then there are the men who are likely to lose 10 or 15 acres to the proposed 401 Highway, which cuts across the county. Some of these men if they "go bulk" are faced with building a new milk house and the next question is, "Should I build it of cement blocks or should I utilize a frame construction?" Frankly, the writer does not profess to have all the answers to these questions. However, the Ontario Department of Agriculture does provide a service which is available to all for the asking. These Agricultural Engineering fieldmen are providing an excellent service on such topics as building construction; renovation of old buildings, including stables; farm drainage; ponds, etc., and that of course includes milk houses and bulk tanks. So if any of our readers would like to avail themselves of this service, further details can be secured from the Agricultural Office in Milton. One word of caution—don't wait until you are to commence operations before making your inquiries!
