Protests Will Come Later

Another public meeting to discuss the proposed zoning by-law will fall as flat as a similar meeting last fall, we predict.

Council could have saved themselves the trouble and gone ahead with whatever action they will take when the matter was discussed on Monday.

The meeting can do no harm, however, and will at least put council and planning board in the position of answering criticism later on by anyone who objects to a zoning restriction and didn't attend the meeting.

Public reaction to such important and complicated measures as zoning tend to come later, after the law comes into effect. The first time a person wants to build a house in an industrial zone, or establish a store in a residential area, there will be plenty of public reaction.

Meanwhile, if we are ever to have zoning, council must avoid further procrastination. Either pass the by-law, or veto it and abandon the lip service to zoning which has been going on now for well over a year.

Orangeville is having an interesting time with proposed installation of parking meters. The move came when council voted 5-4 for the meters, the mayor being the deciding factor. The local Chamber of Commerce is against the meters, and a statement by a councillor that council shouldn't be dictated to, drew editorial response in the Orangeville Banner, pointing out that merchants, who are most affected by the meters, should be listened to . . . Locally, the meters are in the offing and council is studying information received from various firms and will probably proceed later this spring. Here a majority of downtown merchants favour metering and it is . . .
