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## ELEVEN PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN MUSIC COMPETITION HERE

Pupils from 11 public schools, representing six municipalities, competed in the North Halton Urban music festival in Georgetown last Wednesday. The annual event has been held in Milton for some years, and this was the first time Georgetown had been host in many years.

Competition was keen, and adjudicator L. G. Queen, from the Dept. of Education, Toronto, indicated his pleasure in the high standard of performance throughout. Among the highlights was the singing of six senior choirs in unison, with Kenneth R. Harrison, A.R.C.T., B.M.T., conducting them in their number "Now the Day is Over." Later in the program, nine triple trios ended their competition by singing "Summertime" as a group, again with Mr. Harrison, who is Georgetown's school music supervisor, directing.

## WHAT COUNCIL DID

### Wentworth Seeks Annex Nelson, Burlington Area

Reporting to council last week after attending a hearing before the Ontario Municipal Board earlier that day, Reeve Stan Allen expressed his opposition to Wentworth County's request to annex a portion of Halton County.

Wentworth seeks to incorporate Burlington and Nelson Township which, with a portion of East Flamboro is slated to become a new municipality at a later date.

Reeve Allen was critical of the Municipal Board which "in truly democratic fashion" as he phrased it, would listen that day to no one except solicitors for Burlington, Nelson and Flamboro.

County council was hoping it could lodge a protest, he reported, but they weren't allowed to speak.

"The board is ignoring the rights of municipalities to fight for their own interests" he said, indicating that county council plans to obtain top-notch legal aid to oppose an action which would remove a quarter of Halton's assessment.

"It is obvious that annexation is taking place" he continued "and Nelson's protests are falling on deaf ears." He said that at one stage in the hearing the Nelson reeve was ordered to sit down while he was consulting the township's lawyer.

When Burlington-Nelson - East Flamboro union takes place, Reeve Allen said there will be many difficulties to iron out, such as assessment difference, residents at homes for the aged, etc.

He predicted that the situation is "a grand game of shuffling cards under the table" and that the end result might be for Hamilton to eventually annex everything to make it the largest metropolitan area in Canada.

At present, the area is all the town of Burlington, he said, but is seeking township status. If granted, this could be disastrous for the county, he warned, for a township can claim from 15% to 100% rebate on road grants.

A graduate of the University of Toronto and of Osgoode Hall Law School, he commenced practicing law with his father, The firm is now known as Dick, Dick & McWilliams. If Kenneth Dick is honoured with your trust as Federal Representative at Ottawa, he will be in a position to give freely of his time to serve his constituency.

His municipal experience in Halton has already made him an experienced public servant. ## CNE NATURAL GAS CENTRE PLANNED AT FALL SHOW

A modern "Natural Gas Centre"—showing the latest in new appliances and heating equipment—has been planned for the lower floor of the Coliseum building at the 1957 Canadian National Exhibition, it was announced by Hiram E. McCallum, general manager.

The establishment of the Centre is another step in the continued vigorous expansion program of the C.N.E. to maintain it as the world's greatest annual exhibition.

"The Natural Gas Centre will offer to the 3,000,000 annual visitors," said Mr. McCallum, "a comprehensive view of the natural gas industry in an attractive setting in the West Wing of the Coliseum. Present plans call for the industry to show natural gas equipment of all types.

In addition to gas equipment, many related goods and services will be on view so that Canadians will be able to truly see something of the importance of natural gas to Canada's economy," stated Mr. McCallum.

The Exhibition Gas Centre has the enthusiastic support of the industry's leaders and among the companies already indicating they will have exhibits are Moffats Limited, Iron Fireman Mfg. The establishment of the Centre also coincides with the celebration of the Golden Anniversary of the Canadian Gas Association, founded in 1907.
